AN ACT making appropriations for the support of government

AID TO LOCALITIES BUDGET

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

1
2 Section 1. a) The several amounts specified in this chapter for aid to
3 localities, or so much thereof as shall be sufficient to accomplish the
4 purposes designated by the appropriations, are hereby appropriated and
5 authorized to be paid as hereinafter provided, to the respective public
6 officers and for the several purposes specified.

7 b) Where applicable, appropriations made by this chapter for expendi-
8 tures from federal grants for aid to localities may be allocated for
9 spending from federal grants for any grant period beginning, during, or
10 prior to, the state fiscal year beginning on April 1, 2025 except as
11 otherwise noted.

12 c) The several amounts named herein, or so much thereof as shall be
13 sufficient to accomplish the purpose designated, being the undisbursed
14 and/or unexpended balances of the prior year's appropriations, are here-
15 by reappropriated from the same funds and made available for the same
16 purposes as the prior year's appropriations, unless herein amended, for
17 the fiscal year beginning April 1, 2025. Certain reappropriations in
18 this chapter are shown using abbreviated text, with three leader dots
19 (an ellipsis) followed by three spaces (...) used to indicate where
20 existing law that is being continued is not shown. However, unless a
21 change is clearly indicated by the use of brackets [] for deletions and
22 underscores for additions, the purposes, amounts, funding source and all
23 other aspects pertinent to each item of appropriation shall be as last
24 appropriated.

25 For the purpose of complying with the state finance law, the year,
26 chapter and section of the last act reappropriating a former original
27 appropriation or any part thereof is, unless otherwise indicated, chap-
28 ter 53, section 1, of the laws of 2024.

29 d) No moneys appropriated by this chapter shall be available for
30 payment until a certificate of approval has been issued by the director
31 of the budget, who shall file such certificate with the department of
32 audit and control, the chairperson of the senate finance committee and
33 the chairperson of the assembly ways and means committee.

EXPLANATION--Matter in italics (underscored) is new; matter in brackets
[] is old law to be omitted.

1 e) Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, for purposes
2 of any appropriation made by this chapter which authorizes spending in
3 an amount net of refunds, rebates, reimbursements, credits, repayments,
4 and/or disallowances, "refunds" shall mean funds received to the state
5 resulting from the overpayment of monies, "rebates" shall mean funds
6 received to the state resulting from a return of a full or partial
7 amount previously paid, as for goods or services, serving as a
8 reduction, discount or rebate to the original payment amount,
9 "reimbursements" shall mean funds received to the state as repayment in
10 an equivalent amount for goods or services, including but not limited to
11 personal service costs, incurred by the state in the first instance
12 being provided to a third party for their benefit and partially or in
13 full financed by such third party, "credit" shall mean monies made
14 available to the state that reduce the amount owed to a third party,
15 including but not limited to billing errors, rebates, and prior overpay-
16 ments, "repayment" shall mean the return of monies as pay back for
17 expenses incurred, and "disallowance" shall mean monies made available
18 to the state that were not allowed or accepted officially by the
19 intended recipient, based on a determination the payment is not accepta-
20 ble and/or valid. When the office of the state comptroller receives any
21 such refunds, rebates, reimbursements, credits, repayments, and/or
22 disallowances, he or she shall credit the refunded, rebated, reimbursed,
23 credited, repaid, and disallowed amount back to the original appropri-
24 ation and reduce expenditures in the year which such credit is received
25 regardless of the timing of the initial expenditure.

26 f) Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, upon enact-
27 ment of this chapter of the laws of 2025 containing the aid to locali-
28 ties budget bill for the state fiscal year 2025-2026, all appropriations
29 and reappropriations contained in chapter 53 of the laws of 2024, which
30 would otherwise lapse by operation of law on March 31, 2026 are hereby
31 repealed.

32 g) The appropriations contained in this chapter shall be available for
33 the fiscal year beginning on April 1, 2025 except as otherwise noted.

49 requirements established pursuant to
50 section 214 of the elder law, except for
51 base year expenditures. To the extent that
52 funds hereby appropriated are sufficient
53 to exceed the per capita limit established
54 in section 214 of the elder law, the
55 excess funds shall be available to supple-
56 ment the existing per capita level in a
57 uniform manner consistent with statutory
58 allocations.
59 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision
60 of law except pursuant to a chapter of the
61 laws of 2025 authorizing a 2.1 percent
62 targeted inflationary increase, for the

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1 period commencing on April 1, 2025 and
 2 ending March 31, 2026 the director shall
 3 not apply any other inflationary

14 submitted by a social services district
15 for reimbursement for a particular state
16 fiscal year for which the social services
17 district does not receive state or federal
18 reimbursement during that state fiscal
19 year may not be claimed against that
20 district's block grant apportionment for
21 the next state fiscal year.

22 The office of children and family services,
23 with the approval of the director of the
24 budget, may reduce a district's block
25 grant allocation by the state share
26 decrease related to federal retroactive
27 reimbursement for such foster care
28 services identified herein. The office,
29 with the approval of the director of the
30 budget, may reduce a district's block
31 grant allocation by the state share of
32 disallowances or sanctions taken against
33 the district pursuant to the social
34 services law or federal law.

35 Notwithstanding any other provision of law,
36 the state shall not be responsible for
37 reimbursing a social services district and
38 a district shall not seek state reimburse-
39 ment for any portion of any state disal-
40 lowance or sanction taken against the
41 social services district, or any federal
42 disallowance attributable to final federal
43 agency decisions or to settlement made, on
44 or after July 1, 1995, when such disallow-
45 ance or sanction results from the failure
46 of the social services district to comply
47 with federal or state requirements,
48 including, but not limited to, failure to
49 document eligibility for federal or state
50 funds in the case record; provided, howev-
51 er, if the office determines that any
52 federal disallowance for services provided
53 between January 1, 1999 and May 31, 1999
54 results solely from the late enactment of
55 the state legislation implementing the
56 federal adoption and safe families act,
57 the state shall be solely responsible for
58 the full amount of the disallowance or
59 sanction; provided, further, however, this
60 provision shall be deemed to apply both
61 prospectively and retroactively regardless

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1 of whether such sanctions or disallowances
2 are for services provided or claims made
3 prior to or after April 1, 2025.

4 Notwithstanding any other provision of law,
5 any federal disallowance resulting from a
6 federal title IV-E eligibility review or
7 audit that uses extrapolated statistic
8 techniques shall be passed along by the
9 state to any and all social services
10 districts that the office of children and
11 family services has determined have not
12 complied with the title IV-E eligibility
13 requirements or have not taken the neces-
14 sary actions to ensure compliance with
15 such requirements including, but not
16 limited to, failing to: assess and fully
17 document all the criteria and have readily
18 available all the necessary documents to
19 establish and continue title IV-E eligi-
20 bility for all title IV-E eligible chil-
21 dren within the required time frames;
22 claim title IV-E funding only for cases
23 that meet all of the title IV-E eligibil-
24 ity criteria; and fully implement the
25 social services payment system on or
26 before April 1, 2005 for all direct and
27 voluntary agency foster care services.

28 Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the
29 office of children and family services
30 shall impose on social services districts
31 any federal disallowance issued against
32 the state as a result of a federal title
33 IV-E secondary eligibility review regard-
34 less of the date the children may have
35 entered foster care, the date the eligi-
36 bility or payment errors occurred, or the
37 filing date of any federal claims for
38 reimbursement; provided, however, that the
39 state shall be responsible for the disal-
40 lowed costs and expenditures related to
41 the placement of children in a facility
42 operated by the office of children and
43 family services, which shall be determined
44 in the same manner as the disallowed costs
45 and expenditures for social services
46 districts other than the city of New York.
47 In order to reimburse the federal govern-
48 ment for the full amount of any disallow-
49 ance imposed on the state by the federal
50 administration for children and families

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1 The amount of the offset against each

4 cation process. The final allocation of

9 shall be responsible for the amount
10 attributable to each of the district's
11 children or cases that are determined by
12 the federal review to be unallowable. Each
13 district shall also be responsible for a
14 portion of the federal extrapolated disal-
15 lowance amount based on the relative error
16 rate for the district. The city of New
17 York's error rate will be based on the
18 federal sample and federal statistics. For
19 all social services districts other than
20 the city of New York, the error rate will
21 be based on a review conducted by the
22 district of a sample of children and/or
23 cases determined by the office of children
24 and family services and a re-review of a
25 sub-sample by the office of those children
26 and/or cases determined by the office. The
27 office of children and family services
28 will determine what is reasonable in
29 establishing the size of the sample and
30 sub-sample for each district. The office
31 of children and family services shall
32 notify each social services district of
33 the sample of children and/or cases from
34 the federal audit period that the social
35 services district must review. Any child
36 or case from the social services district
37 that was included in the federal sample
38 will automatically be included in the
39 social services district's review sample
40 and the determination made at the federal
41 review regarding that child or case will
42 govern for the purposes of the social
43 services district's review. The social
44 services district must complete and submit
45 the results of its review to the office of
46 children and family services within 60
47 days of receipt of the sample. The error
48 rate for the district will be based on the
49 findings of the district's review and the
50 office of children and family services'
51 re-review. If a social services district
52 does not complete its review within 60
53 days of receiving the sample from the
54 office of children and family services,
55 the office of children and family services
56 shall assign an error rate to the social
57 services district based on the relative
58 percentage of the district's applicable
59 title IV-E claims for the relevant period
60 as compared to applicable statewide title
61 IV-E claims for that period and other

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1 circumstances that the office of children
2 and family services may consider in order
3 to allocate 100 percent of the federal
4 disallowance. The office of children and
5 family services shall apply each social
6 services district's error rate to the
7 total amount of the district's applicable
8 title IV-E claims including associated
9 administrative expenses. The resulting
10 dollar amounts for all of the social
11 services districts will be summed to
12 derive the total amount of title IV-E
13 claims deemed to be in error statewide. To
14 establish a disallowance percentage for
15 each social services district, the amount
16 of the district's title IV-E claims deemed
17 to be in error will be divided by the
18 amount of statewide title IV-E claims
19 deemed to be in error. The resulting
20 disallowance percentage for each district
21 will be applied to the entire title IV-E
22 extrapolated disallowance calculated by
23 the federal review to determine the amount
24 of the extrapolated disallowance for which
25 the district is responsible. Each district
26 will be credited for the amount already
27 disallowed for any individual children or
28 cases found to be in error during the
29 federal review. The exclusive appeal
30 rights for the review of the amount of the
31 federal disallowance assigned to each
32 social services district shall be pursuant
33 to article 78 of the civil practice law
34 and rules; provided, however, that in any
35 such action all of the social services
36 districts shall be joined as necessary
37 parties and the venue of any such action
38 shall be in Rensselaer county. Any social
39 services district that fails to complete
40 its sample review in the required time
41 frames shall have no right to appeal and
42 shall not be a necessary party to any
43 action brought by another social services
44 district.

45 The money hereby appropriated is to be
46 available for payment of state aid hereto-
47 fore accrued or hereafter to accrue to
48 municipalities. Subject to the approval of
49 the director of the budget, such funds
50 shall be available to the office net of
51 disallowances, refunds, reimbursements,

53 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision
54 of law, the amount herein appropriated may
55 be transferred to any other appropriation

22 by the state comptroller or the state

51 family services shall, on a quarterly
52 basis, request that the office of tempo-
53 rary and disability assistance reimburse

59 Notwithstanding any other provision of law
60 to the contrary, amounts due and owing to
61 a social services district under this

4 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision
5 of law, the amount appropriated herein
6 shall be made available to reimburse 62
7 percent of eligible social services
8 district expenditures that are claimed by
9 March 31, 2027 for child welfare services
10 which shall include and be limited to
11 preventive services provided pursuant to
12 section 409-a of the social services law
13 other than community optional preventive
14 services, child protective services, inde-
15 pendent living services, after-care
16 services as defined in regulations of the
17 department of family assistance, and
18 adoption administration and services,
19 other than adoption subsidies provided
20 pursuant to title 9 of article 6 of the
21 social services law and regulations of the
22 department of family assistance incurred
23 on or after October 1, 2025 and before
24 October 1, 2026, or before October 1,

42 adoption administration.
43 The money hereby appropriated is to be
44 available for payment of state aid hereto-
45 fore accrued or hereafter to accrue to
46 municipalities. Subject to the approval of
47 the director of the budget, such funds
48 shall be available to the office net of
49 disallowances, refunds, reimbursements,
50 and credits; provided, however, that
51 notwithstanding any other provision of
52 law, for a district to receive reimburse-
53 ment for such services, the amount of
54 funds that the district expends on such
55 services from its flexible fund for family
56 services allocation and any flexible fund
57 for family services funds transferred at
58 the district's request to the title XX
59 social services block grant must, to the
60 extent that families are eligible there-
61 fore, be equal to or greater than the

38 localities appropriation available to such
39 districts to transfer to any miscellaneous
40 special revenue fund available to the
41 office of children and family services to
42 use for the local share of the federal
43 funds available for education and training
44 vouchers provided in accordance with
45 section 477 of title IV-E of the social
46 security act as authorized by such social
47 services districts which choose to use
48 funds to support such costs.

49 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision
50 of law, the amount herein appropriated may
51 be transferred to any other appropriation
52 within the office of children and family
53 services and/or the office of temporary

57 paying local social services districts'

28 2024 through September 30, 2025 at a cost
29 that does not exceed the cost that was in
30 effect on October 1, 2008 and that a
31 social services district can demonstrate

7 services including care, maintenance, supervision, and tuition; for
8 supervision of foster children placed in federally funded job corps
9 programs; for care, maintenance, supervision, and tuition for
10 adjudicated juvenile delinquents placed in residential programs
11 operated by authorized agencies and in out-of-state residential
12 programs; for the provision and administration of the kinship
13 guardian assistance program including kinship guardianship
14 assistance payments and payments for non-recurring guardianship
15 expenses and eligible expenditures associated with local compliance
16 with the federal Family First Prevention Services Act (P.L. 115-
17 123); except that, reimbursement from the amount appropriated herein
18 shall not be available for tuition expenditures for foster children,
19 including persons in need of supervision and adjudicated juvenile
20 delinquents, made by a social services district located within a
21 city having a population of one million or more.

22 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a portion of the funds are
23 available to reimburse social services districts for the change in
24 the maximum state aid rates established by the office of children
25 and family services for the 2024-25 rate year pursuant to section
26 398-a of the social services law and sections 4003 and 4405 of the
27 education law to reflect the continuation of the cost of living
28 adjustments that became effective April 1, 2008 for payments made to
29 foster parents and for salary and fringe benefit costs and other
30 critical nonpersonal services costs for foster care programs as
31 determined by the office. Social services districts must adjust the
32 amount of payments made for care provided by congregate care and
33 foster boarding home programs and to foster parents to reflect the
34 cost of living adjustments in the manner specified by the office.
35 Each authorized agency operating a congregate care or foster
36 boarding home program in New York state for which the office sets a
37 maximum state aid rate pursuant to section 398-a of the social
38 services law or section 4003 or 4405 of the education law shall
39 submit, at the time and in a manner to be determined by the office,
40 a written certification, attesting that the funds received for the
41 continuation of the cost of living adjustment to the maximum state
42 aid rate that became effective April 1, 2008 for that program will
43 be or were used solely in accordance with the requirements of the
44 cost of living adjustment established by the office.

45 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision of law including, but not
46 limited to, any chapter of the laws of 2024 which enacts a cost of
47 living adjustment for the state fiscal year beginning on April 1,
48 2024, the commissioner shall continue to apply any cost of living
49 adjustment increase in effect on March 31, 2024 for the entire rate
50 year that began when such cost of living adjustment increase was in
51 effect. Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision of law, the
52 commissioner shall apply a 2.84 percent cost of living adjustment
53 for the rate year that begins on July 1, 2024 for the purposes of
54 establishing rates of payments, contracts, or any other form of
55 reimbursement, provided that this shall not prevent the commissioner
56 from applying additional trend or staff retention factors for this
57 program.

58 Within the amounts appropriated herein, state reimbursement to each
59 social services district for services identified herein that are
60 otherwise reimbursable by the state from April 1, 2024 through March
61 31, 2025 shall be limited to a district allocation, hereinafter

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1 referred to as the district's block grant allocation.
2 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, such block grant
3 allocation shall be based, in part, on each district's claims for
4 such costs, adjusted by the applicable cost allocation methodology
5 and net of any retroactive payments for the 12 month period ending
6 June 30, 2023 that are submitted on or before January 2, 2024 and,
7 in part, on such other factors as determined by the office of
8 children and family services and approved by the director of the
9 budget. Any portion of a social services district's allocation from
10 funds appropriated herein not claimed by such district during the
11 state fiscal year may be used by such district for expenditures on
12 preventive services provided pursuant to section 409-a of the social
13 services law, independent living services and aftercare services
14 provided pursuant to regulations of the department of family
15 assistance, claimed by such district during the next state fiscal
16 year up to the amount remaining from the district's foster care
17 block grant allocation, provided however, that any claims for such
18 services during the next state fiscal year in excess of such amount
19 shall be subject to 62 percent state reimbursement exclusive of any
20 federal funds made available for such purposes, in accordance with
21 directives of the department of family assistance and subject to the
22 approval of the director of the budget. Any claims submitted by a
23 social services district for reimbursement for a particular state
24 fiscal year for which the social services district does not receive
25 state or federal reimbursement during that state fiscal year may not
26 be claimed against that district's block grant apportionment for the
27 next state fiscal year.

28 The office of children and family services, with the approval of the
29 director of the budget, may reduce a district's block grant
30 allocation by the state share decrease related to federal
31 retroactive reimbursement for such foster care services identified
32 herein. The office, with the approval of the director of the budget,
33 may reduce a district's block grant allocation by the state share of
34 disallowances or sanctions taken against the district pursuant to
35 the social services law or federal law.

36 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the state shall not be
37 responsible for reimbursing a social services district and a
38 district shall not seek state reimbursement for any portion of any
39 state disallowance or sanction taken against the social services
40 district, or any federal disallowance attributable to final federal
41 agency decisions or to settlement made, on or after July 1, 1995,
42 when such disallowance or sanction results from the failure of the
43 social services district to comply with federal or state
44 requirements, including, but not limited to, failure to document
45 eligibility for federal or state funds in the case record; provided,
46 however, if the office determines that any federal disallowance for
47 services provided between January 1, 1999 and May 31, 1999 results
48 solely from the late enactment of the state legislation implementing
49 the federal adoption and safe families act, the state shall be
50 solely responsible for the full amount of the disallowance or
51 sanction; provided, further, however, this provision shall be deemed
52 to apply both prospectively and retroactively regardless of whether
53 such sanctions or disallowances are for services provided or claims
54 made prior to or after April 1, 2024.

55 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, any federal disallowance
56 resulting from a federal title IV-E eligibility review or audit that
57 uses extrapolated statistic techniques shall be passed along by the
58 state to any and all social services districts that the office of
59 children and family services has determined have not complied with
60 the title IV-E eligibility requirements or have not taken the
61 necessary actions to ensure compliance with such requirements

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1 including, but not limited to, failing to: assess and fully document
2 all the criteria and have readily available all the necessary
3 documents to establish and continue title IV-E eligibility for all
4 title IV-E eligible children within the required time frames; claim
5 title IV-E funding only for cases that meet all of the title IV-E
6 eligibility criteria; and fully implement the social services
7 payment system on or before April 1, 2005 for all direct and
8 voluntary agency foster care services.

9 Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the office of children and
10 family services shall impose on social services districts any
11 federal disallowance issued against the state as a result of a
12 federal title IV-E secondary eligibility review regardless of the
13 date the children may have entered foster care, the date the
14 eligibility or payment errors occurred, or the filing date of any
15 federal claims for reimbursement; provided, however, that the state
16 shall be responsible for the disallowed costs and expenditures
17 related to the placement of children in a facility operated by the
18 office of children and family services, which shall be determined in
19 the same manner as the disallowed costs and expenditures for social
20 services districts other than the city of New York. In order to
21 reimburse the federal government for the full amount of any
22 disallowance imposed on the state by the federal administration for
23 children and families within the timeframes necessary to avoid any
24 potential interest payments on such amount, the office of children
25 and family services is authorized to immediately offset funds
26 otherwise due to each district for a pro rata share of the total
27 disallowed costs based on the percentage of applicable federal title
28 IV-E claims made by that district for the relevant time period as
29 compared to the total applicable statewide title IV-E claims. The
30 amount of the offset against each district will be adjusted, if
31 necessary, upon completion of the disallowance allocation process.
32 The final allocation of the amount of any federal disallowance
33 resulting from a title IV-E secondary eligibility review shall be
34 allocated among the districts so that each district shall be
35 responsible for the amount attributable to each of the district's
36 children or cases that are determined by the federal review to be
37 unallowable. Each district shall also be responsible for a portion
38 of the federal extrapolated disallowance amount based on the
39 relative error rate for the district. The city of New York's error
40 rate will be based on the federal sample and federal statistics. For
41 all social services districts other than the city of New York, the
42 error rate will be based on a review conducted by the district of a
43 sample of children and/or cases determined by the office of children
44 and family services and a re-review of a sub-sample by the office of
45 those children and/or cases determined by the office. The office of
46 children and family services will determine what is reasonable in
47 establishing the size of the sample and sub-sample for each
48 district. The office of children and family services shall notify
49 each social services district of the sample of children and/or cases
50 from the federal audit period that the social services district must
51 review. Any child or case from the social services district that was
52 included in the federal sample will automatically be included in the
53 social services district's review sample and the determination made
54 at the federal review regarding that child or case will govern for
55 the purposes of the social services district's review. The social
56 services district must complete and submit the results of its review
57 to the office of children and family services within 60 days of
58 receipt of the sample. The error rate for the district will be based
59 on the findings of the district's review and the office of children
60 and family services' re-review. If a social services district does
61 not complete its review within 60 days of receiving the sample from

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1 the office of children and family services, the office of children
2 and family services shall assign an error rate to the social
3 services district based on the relative percentage of the district's
4 applicable title IV-E claims for the relevant period as compared to
5 applicable statewide title IV-E claims for that period and other
6 circumstances that the office of children and family services may
7 consider in order to allocate 100 percent of the federal
8 disallowance. The office of children and family services shall apply
9 each social services district's error rate to the total amount of
10 the district's applicable title IV-E claims including associated
11 administrative expenses. The resulting dollar amounts for all of the
12 social services districts will be summed to derive the total amount
13 of title IV-E claims deemed to be in error statewide. To establish a
14 disallowance percentage for each social services district, the
15 amount of the district's title IV-E claims deemed to be in error
16 will be divided by the amount of statewide title IV-E claims deemed
17 to be in error. The resulting disallowance percentage for each
18 district will be applied to the entire title IV-E extrapolated
19 disallowance calculated by the federal review to determine the
20 amount of the extrapolated disallowance for which the district is
21 responsible. Each district will be credited for the amount already
22 disallowed for any individual children or cases found to be in error
23 during the federal review. The exclusive appeal rights for the
24 review of the amount of the federal disallowance assigned to each
25 social services district shall be pursuant to article 78 of the
26 civil practice law and rules; provided, however, that in any such
27 action all of the social services districts shall be joined as
28 necessary parties and the venue of any such action shall be in
29 Rensselaer county. Any social services district that fails to
30 complete its sample review in the required time frames shall have no
31 right to appeal and shall not be a necessary party to any action
32 brought by another social services district.

33 The money hereby appropriated is to be available for payment of state
34 aid heretofore accrued or hereafter to accrue to municipalities.
35 Subject to the approval of the director of the budget, such funds
36 shall be available to the office net of disallowances, refunds,
37 reimbursements, and credits.

38 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision of law, the amount herein
39 appropriated may be transferred to any other appropriation within
40 the office of children and family services and/or the office of
41 temporary and disability assistance and/or suballocated to the
42 office of temporary and disability assistance for the purpose of
43 paying local social services districts' costs of the above program
44 and may be increased or decreased by interchange with any other
45 appropriation or with any other item or items within the amounts
46 appropriated within the office of children and family services
47 general fund - local assistance account with the approval of the
48 director of the budget who shall file such approval with the
49 department of audit and control and copies thereof with the chairman
50 of the senate finance committee and the chairman of the assembly
51 ways and means committee.

52 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision of law, in lieu of
53 payments authorized by the social services law, or payments of
54 federal funds otherwise due to the local social services districts
55 for programs provided under the federal social security act or the
56 federal food stamp act, funds herein appropriated, in amounts
57 certified by the state comptroller or the state commissioner of
58 health as due from local social services districts each month as
59 their share of payments made pursuant to section 367-b of the social
60 services law may be set aside by the state comptroller in an
61 interest bearing account with such interest accruing to the credit

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1 of the locality in order to ensure the orderly and prompt payment of
2 providers under section 367-b of the social services law pursuant to
3 an estimate provided by the commissioner of health of each local
4 social services district's share of payments made pursuant to
5 section 367-b of the social services law.

6 Notwithstanding the provisions of any other law to the contrary, the
7 office of children and family services may, on behalf of social
8 services districts, make payments to foster boarding homes paid
9 directly by social services districts by direct deposit or debit
10 card. Local social services districts shall reimburse the office for
11 the costs of administering such direct deposit or debit card
12 payments.

13 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision of the social services law
14 or the state finance law, the office of children and family services
15 shall, on a quarterly basis, request that the office of temporary
16 and disability assistance reimburse the office of children and
17 family services for the non-federal share of the costs of
18 administering such direct deposit or debit card payments to capture
19 the local share of such costs.

20 Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary, amounts
21 due and owing to a social services district under this
22 appropriation, may be reduced up to such amounts due and owing to
23 the state under section 529 of the executive law (13997)
24 403,866,000 (re. \$201,933,000)

25 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision of law, the amount
26 appropriated herein shall be made available to reimburse 62 percent
27 of eligible social services district expenditures that are claimed
28 by March 31, 2026 for child welfare services which shall include and
29 be limited to preventive services provided pursuant to section 409-a
30 of the social services law other than community optional preventive
31 services, child protective services, independent living services,
32 after-care services as defined in regulations of the department of
33 family assistance, and adoption administration and services, other
34 than adoption subsidies provided pursuant to title 9 of article 6 of
35 the social services law and regulations of the department of family
36 assistance incurred on or after October 1, 2024 and before October
37 1, 2025 and that are otherwise reimbursable by the state on or after
38 April 1, 2024, after first deducting therefrom any federal funds
39 properly received or to be received on account thereof upon
40 certification by the social services district that it will not be
41 using these funds to supplant other state and local funds and that
42 the district will not submit claims for reimbursement under this
43 appropriation for the same type and level of services that the
44 county previously provided and claimed under any contract in
45 existence on October 1, 2002 as other than child protective,
46 preventive, independent living, after care or adoption services or
47 adoption administration.

48 The money hereby appropriated is to be available for payment of state
49 aid heretofore accrued or hereafter to accrue to municipalities.
50 Subject to the approval of the director of the budget, such funds
51 shall be available to the office net of disallowances, refunds,
52 reimbursements, and credits; provided, however, that notwithstanding
53 any other provision of law, for a district to receive reimbursement
54 for such services, the amount of funds that the district expends on
55 such services from its flexible fund for family services allocation
56 and any flexible fund for family services funds transferred at the
57 district's request to the title XX social services block grant must,
58 to the extent that families are eligible therefore, be equal to or
59 greater than the district's portion of the \$457,322,341 statewide
60 child welfare threshold amount, which shall be established pursuant
61 to a formula developed by the office of temporary and disability

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1 assistance and the office of children and family services and
2 approved by the director of the budget.

3 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, selected social services
4 districts may authorize the office of temporary and disability
5 assistance to intercept a portion of the funds on behalf of the
6 office of children and family services otherwise due to the
7 districts under this appropriation and/or under any other general
8 fund - aid to localities appropriation available to such districts
9 to suballocate to the office of mental health and subsequently for
10 suballocation from the office of mental health to the department of
11 health to use for the 38.9 percent of the non-federal share of the
12 medical assistance payments for home and community based waiver
13 services provided in accordance with subdivision 9 of section 366 of
14 the social services law as authorized by such selected social
15 services districts which choose to use preventive services funds to
16 support such costs.

17 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, social services districts
18 may authorize the office of temporary and disability assistance to
19 intercept a portion of the funds on behalf of the office of children
20 and family services otherwise due to the districts under this
21 appropriation and/or under any other general fund - aid to
22 localities appropriation available to such districts to transfer to
23 any miscellaneous special revenue fund available to the office of
24 children and family services to use for the local share of the
25 federal funds available for education and training vouchers provided
26 in accordance with section 477 of title IV-E of the social security
27 act as authorized by such social services districts which choose to
28 use funds to support such costs.

29 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision of law, the amount herein
30 appropriated may be transferred to any other appropriation within
31 the office of children and family services and/or the office of
32 temporary and disability assistance and/or suballocated to the
33 office of temporary and disability assistance for the purpose of
34 paying local social services districts' costs of the above program
35 and may be increased or decreased by interchange with any other
36 appropriation or with any other item or items within the amounts
37 appropriated within the office of children and family services
38 general fund - local assistance account with the approval of the
39 director of the budget who shall file such approval with the
40 department of audit and control and copies thereof with the chairman
41 of the senate finance committee and the chairman of the assembly
42 ways and means committee.

43 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision of law, in lieu of
44 payments authorized by the social services law, or payments of
45 federal funds otherwise due to the local social services districts
46 for programs provided under the federal social security act or the
47 federal food stamp act, funds herein appropriated, in amounts
48 certified by the state comptroller or the state commissioner of
49 health as due from local social services districts each month as
50 their share of payments made pursuant to section 367-b of the social
51 services law may be set aside by the state comptroller in an interest
52 bearing account with such interest accruing to the credit of the
53 locality in order to ensure the orderly and prompt payment of
54 providers under section 367-b of the social services law pursuant to
55 an estimate provided by the commissioner of health of each local
56 social services district's share of payments made pursuant to section
57 367-b of the social services law.

58 Notwithstanding the provisions of any other law to the contrary, the
59 office of children and family services may, on behalf of local
60 social services districts, make payments for adoption subsidies by
61 direct deposit or debit card. Local social services districts shall

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1 reimburse the office for the costs of administering such direct
2 deposit or debit card payments.

3 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision of the social services law
4 or the state finance law, the office of children and family services
5 shall, on a quarterly basis, request that the office of temporary
6 and disability assistance reimburse the office of children and
7 family services in an amount equal to 38 percent of the non-federal
8 share of the costs of administering such direct deposit or debit
9 card payments to capture the local share of such costs.

10 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the office of children and
11 family services shall reissue per diem rates, required pursuant to
12 section 529 of the executive law, for calendar years 2002 through
13 2009 to remove any adjustments to the costs included in determining
14 such rates to reflect any changes in federal funding made available
15 to the office or to local social services districts for such costs
16 and, provided further, the office shall not include any such
17 adjustments in per diem rates established hereafter.

18 All reimbursement made by local social services districts for care,
19 maintenance and supervision under this section shall be paid
20 directly to the state through the office of children and family
21 services for deposit into a miscellaneous special revenue fund known
22 as the youth facility per diem account.

23 Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary, amounts
24 due and owing to a social services district under this
25 appropriation, may be reduced up to such amounts due and owing to
26 the state under section 529 of the executive law (13998)
27 900,045,000 (re. \$900,045,000)

28 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the amount appropriated
29 herein shall be available to reimburse for 98 percent of 65 percent
30 of eligible social services district expenditures that are claimed
31 by March 31, 2025 for those community preventive services provided
32 from October 1, 2023 through September 30, 2024 at a cost that does
33 not exceed the cost that was in effect on October 1, 2008 and that a
34 social services district can demonstrate had been approved by the
35 office of children and family services on or before October 1, 2008;
36 provided, however, that should insufficient funds be available to
37 provide state reimbursement for 98 percent of 65 percent of such
38 costs, reimbursement shall be made proportionally to each district
39 based on the percentage of their total eligible claims to the amount
40 appropriated; and, provided further, however, that if the amount
41 appropriated exceeds the amount of funds necessary to reimburse 98
42 percent of 65 percent of the eligible social services district
43 expenditures, the office may, to the extent funds are available,

54 effectiveness be submitted to the office of children and family
55 services in a form and manner and at such times as required by the
56 office. Of the amount appropriated herein, up to \$1,000,000 may be
57 used to provide additional funding to an eligible program or
58 programs with evaluation results that show program effectiveness and
59 demonstrate private monetary support as determined by the office of
60 children and family services and approved by the director of the

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1 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, for services provided
 2 prior to April 1, 2019 and suballocation to the office of mental
 3 health and subsequently for suballocation from the office of mental
 4 health to the department of health for 94 percent of 65 percent of
 5 the nonfederal share of medical assistance payments for home and
 6 community based waiver services provided in accordance with
 7 subdivision 9 of section 366 of the social services law as
 8 authorized by selected social services districts which choose to use
 9 preventive services funds to support such costs and to authorize the
 10 office of temporary and disability assistance to intercept funds
 11 otherwise due to the districts to provide the 38.9 percent local
 12 share of such preventive services expenditures (14001)
 13 6,213,000 (re. \$6,213,000)
 14 For services and expenses of the office of children and family
 15 services and local social services districts for activities
 16 necessary to comply with certain provisions of the adoption and safe

42 The appropriation made by chapter 53, section 1, of the laws of 2024, is
43 hereby amended and reappropriated to read:

44 For the medical assistance program, including administrative expenses,
45 for local social services districts, and for medical care rates for
46 authorized child care agencies.

47 Notwithstanding section 40 of the state finance law or any provision
48 of law to the contrary, subject to federal approval, department of
49 health state funds medicaid spending, excluding payments for medical
50 services provided at state facilities operated by the office of
51 mental health, the office for people with developmental disabilities
52 and the office of addiction services and supports and further
53 excluding any payments which are not appropriated within the
54 department of health, in the aggregate, for the period April 1, 2024
55 through [March 31, 2025], September 15, 2025, shall not exceed
56 [\$31,634,010,000] \$31,731,725,000 except as provided below provided,
57 however, such aggregate limits may be adjusted by the director of
58 the budget to account for any changes in the New York state federal
59 medical assistance percentage amount established pursuant to the
60 federal social security act, increases in provider revenues,
61 reductions in local social services district payments for medical
62 assistance administration, minimum wage increases, and beginning

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1 April 1, 2012 the operational costs of the New York state medical
2 indemnity fund, pursuant to chapter 59 of the laws of 2011, and
3 state costs or savings from the essential plan program. Such
4 projections may be adjusted by the director of the budget to account
5 for increased or expedited department of health state funds medicaid
6 expenditures as a result of a natural or other type of disaster,
7 including a governmental declaration of emergency.

8 The director of the budget, in consultation with the commissioner of
9 health, shall assess on a quarterly basis known and projected

41 of the state, to the extent practicable, and shall be made uniformly
42 within a category of service, to the extent practicable, except
43 where the commissioner determines that there are sufficient grounds
44 for non-uniformity, including but not limited to: the extent to
45 which specific categories of services contributed to department of
46 health medicaid state funds spending in excess of the limits
47 specified herein; the need to maintain safety net services in
48 underserved communities; or the potential benefits of pursuing
49 innovative payment models contemplated by the Affordable Care Act,
50 in which case such grounds shall be set forth in the medicaid
51 savings allocation adjustment; and (5) reductions shall be made in a
52 manner that does not unnecessarily create administrative burdens to
53 medicaid applicants and recipients or providers.

54 The commissioner shall seek the input of the legislature, as well as
55 organizations representing health care providers, consumers,
56 businesses, workers, health insurers, and others with relevant
57 expertise, in developing such medicaid savings allocation
58 adjustment, to the extent that all or part of such adjustment, in
59 the discretion of the commissioner, is likely to have a material
60 impact on the overall medicaid program, particular categories of
61 service or particular geographic regions of the state.

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1 (a) The commissioner shall post the medicaid savings allocation
2 adjustment on the department of health's website and shall provide

46 The department of health shall prepare a quarterly report that sets
47 forth: (a) known and projected department of health medicaid
48 expenditures as described in subdivision (1) of this section, and
49 factors that could result in medicaid disbursements for the relevant
50 state fiscal year to exceed the projected department of health state
51 funds disbursements in the enacted budget financial plan pursuant to
52 subdivision 3 of section 23 of the state finance law, including
53 spending increases or decreases due to: enrollment fluctuations,
54 rate changes, utilization changes, MRT investments, and shift of
55 beneficiaries to managed care; and variations in offline medicaid
56 payments; and (b) the actions taken to implement any medicaid
