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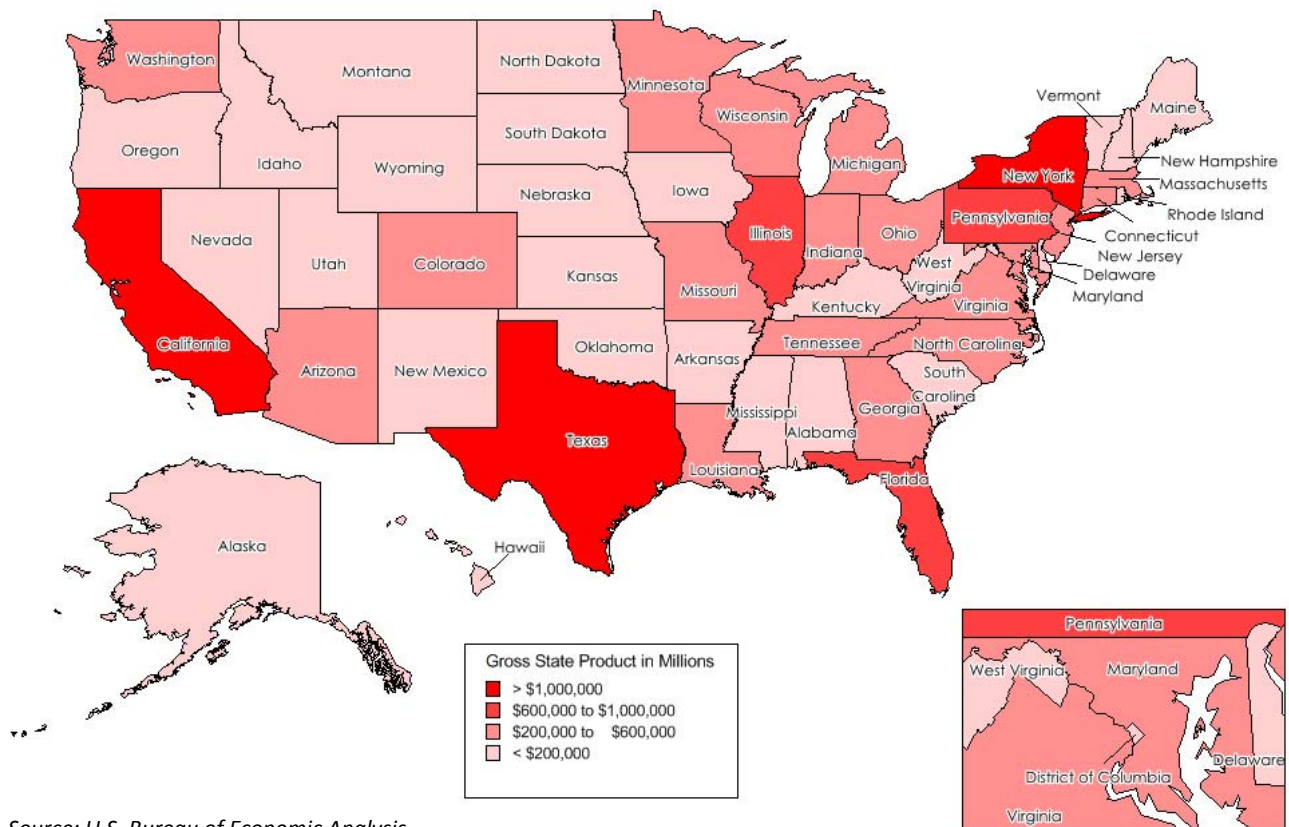
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Economy

- New York ranked seventh in Gross State Product per Capita at \$61,621 in 2012.

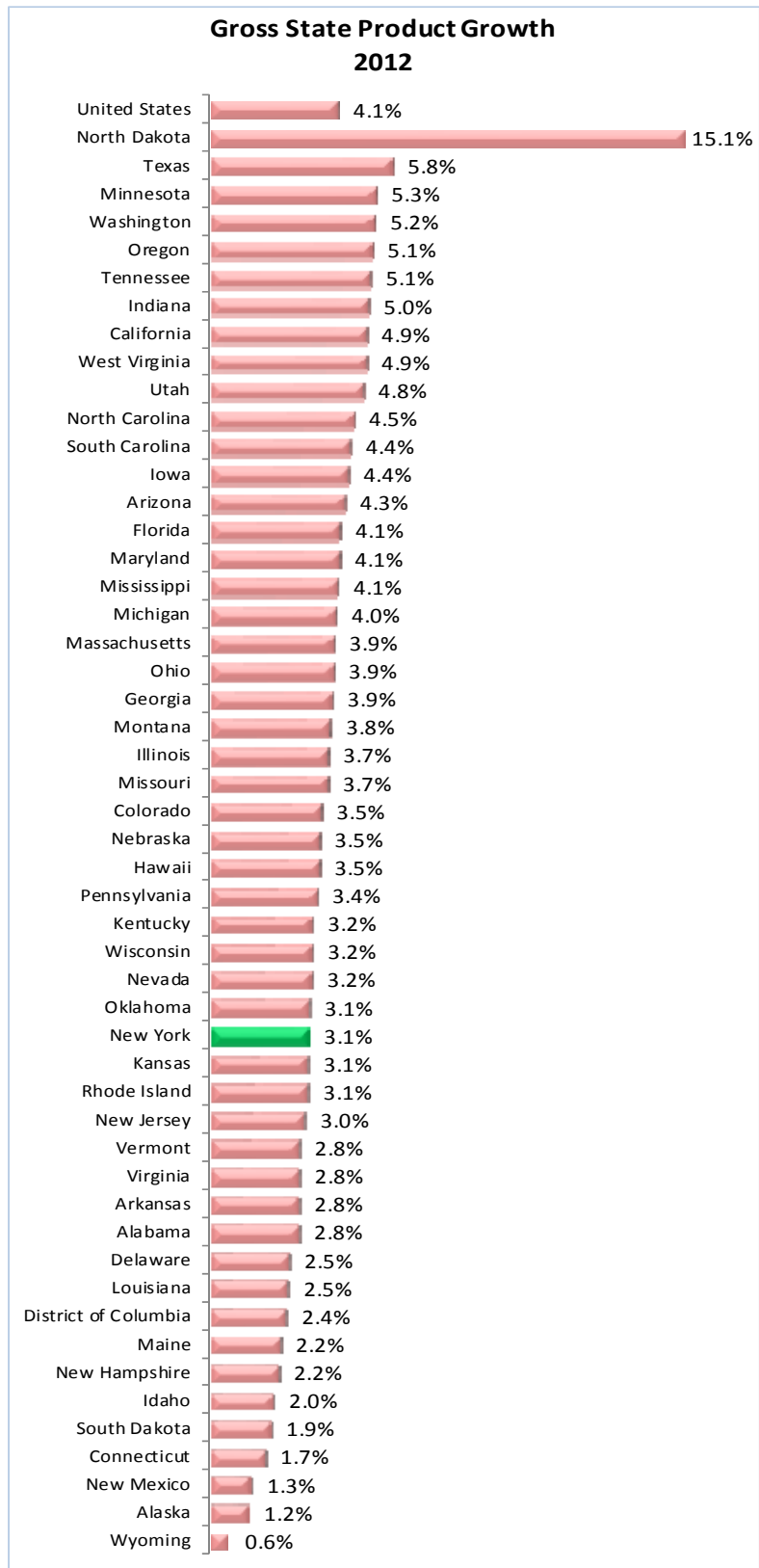
Gross State Product

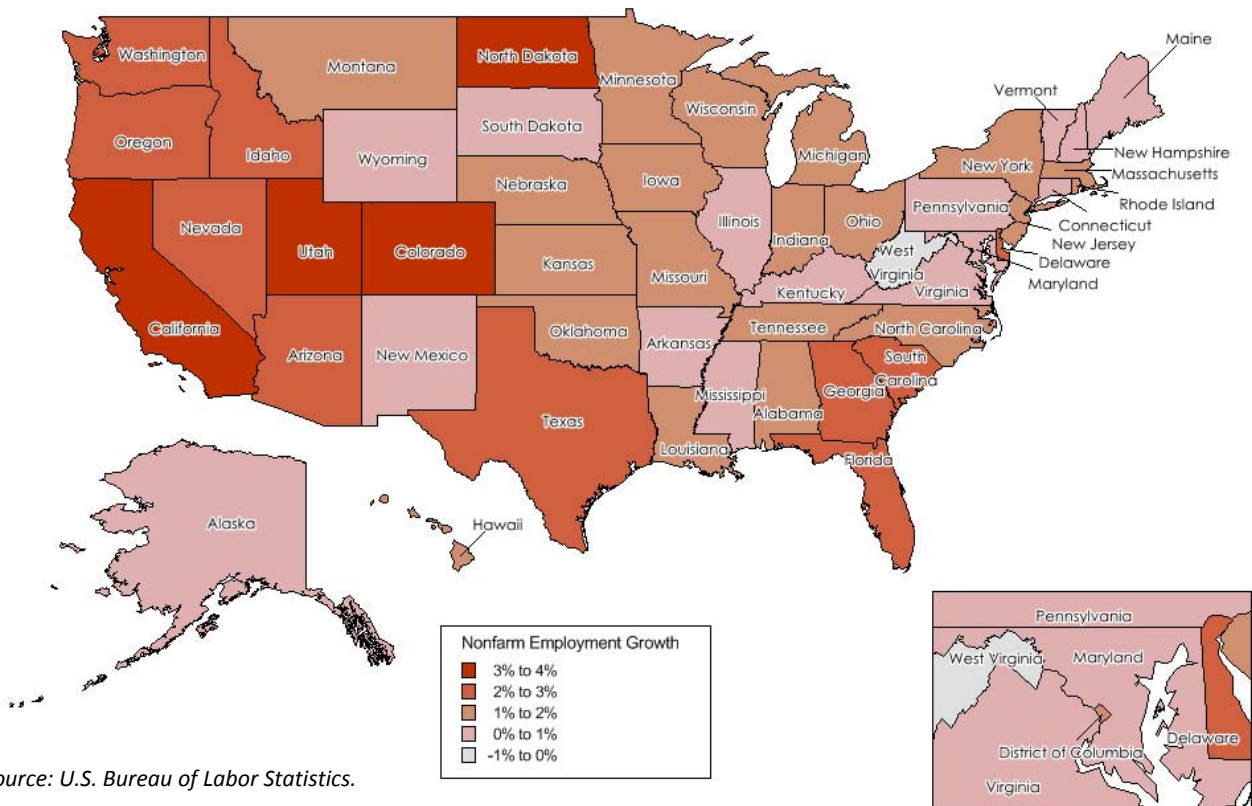

- New York State nonfarm employment growth was 1.3 percent in 2013, ranked 26th among all states.

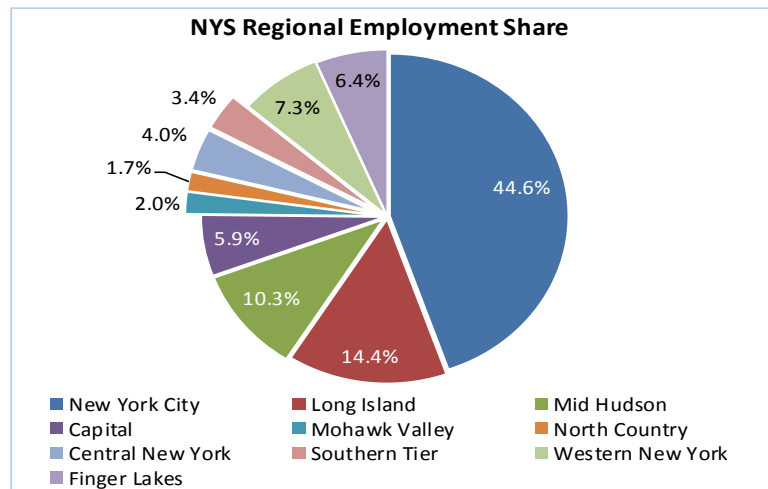
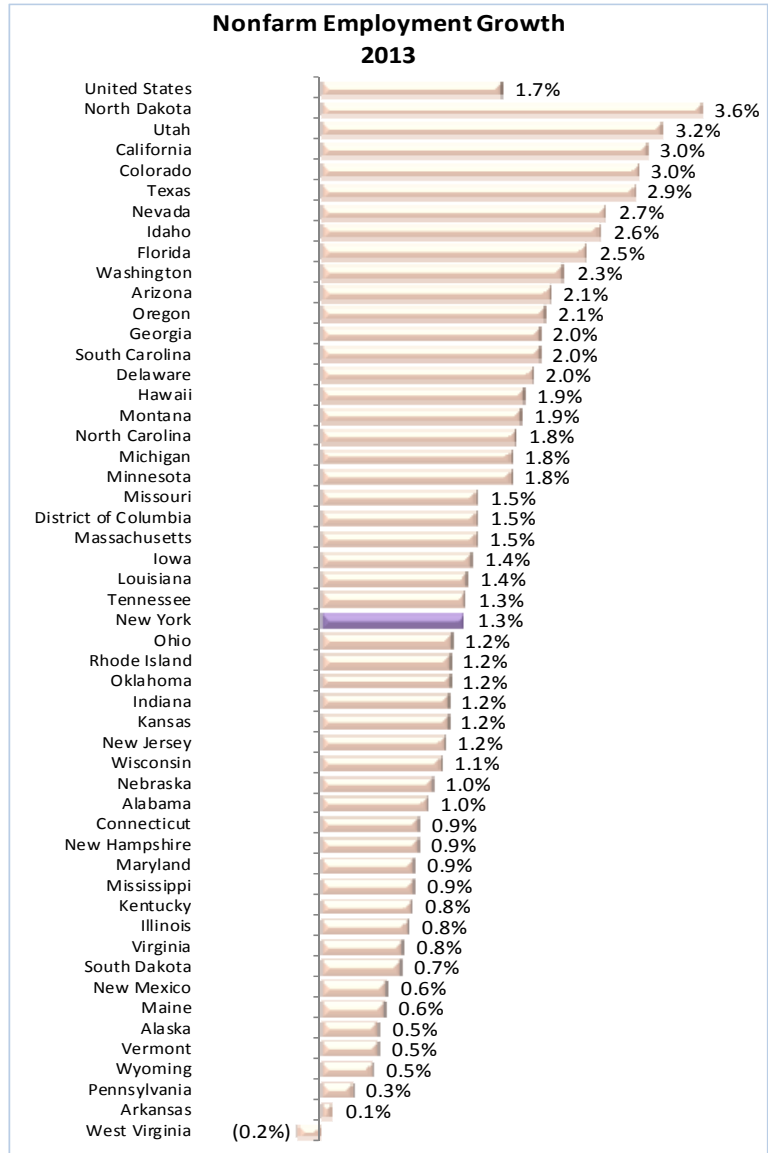
Total Nonfarm Employment Growth

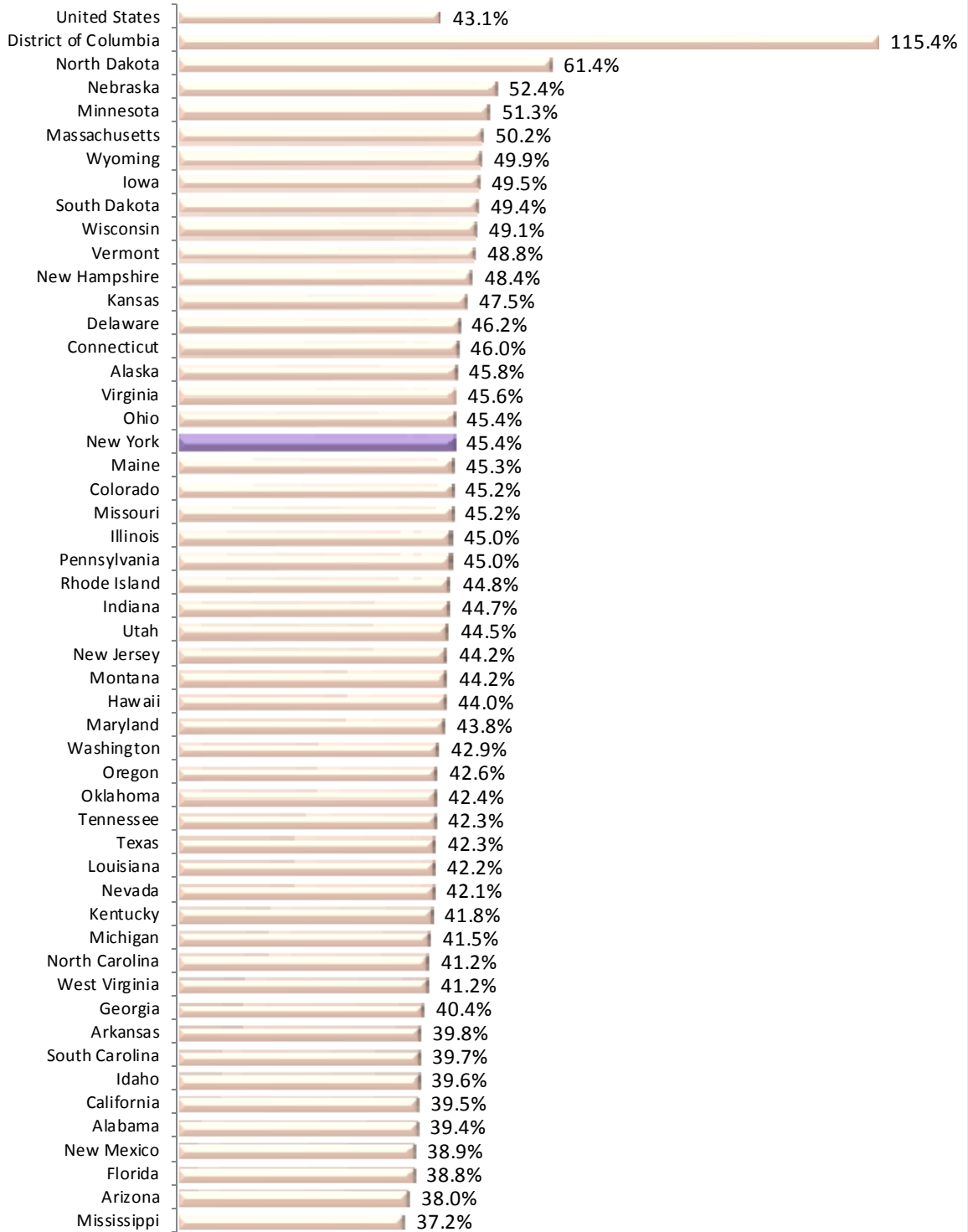

Nonfarm Employment to Population Ratio 2013



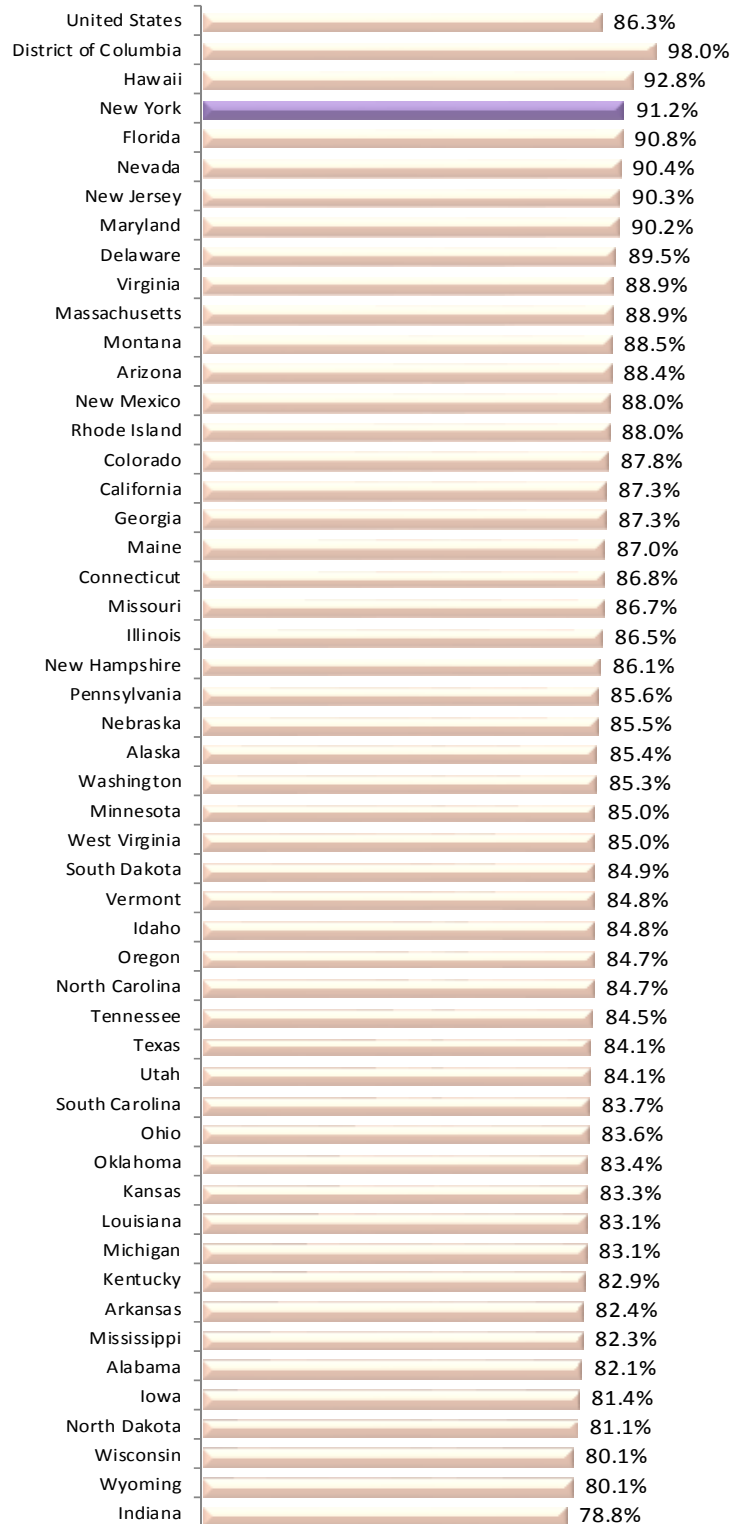

Service-Providing Employment As a Share of Nonfarm Employment 2013

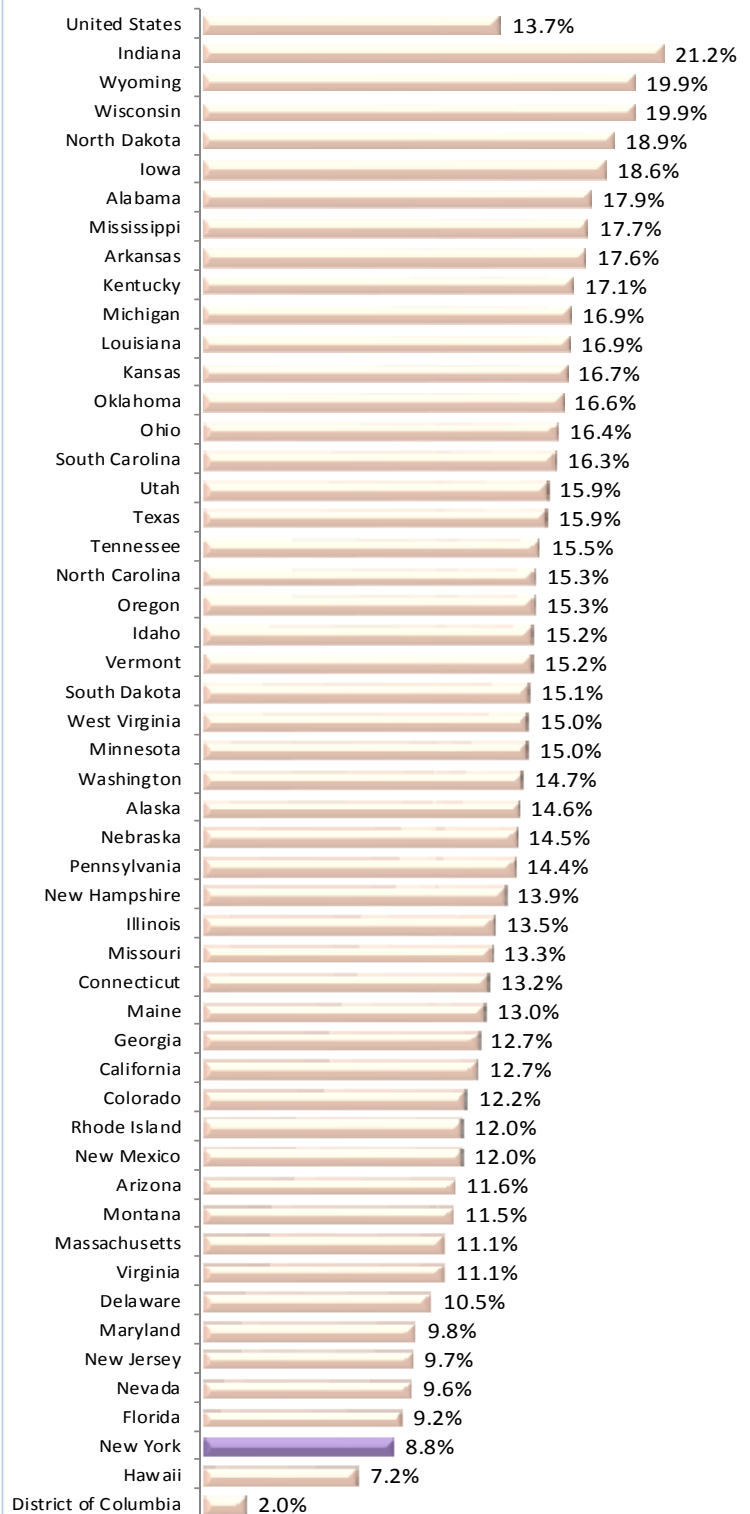

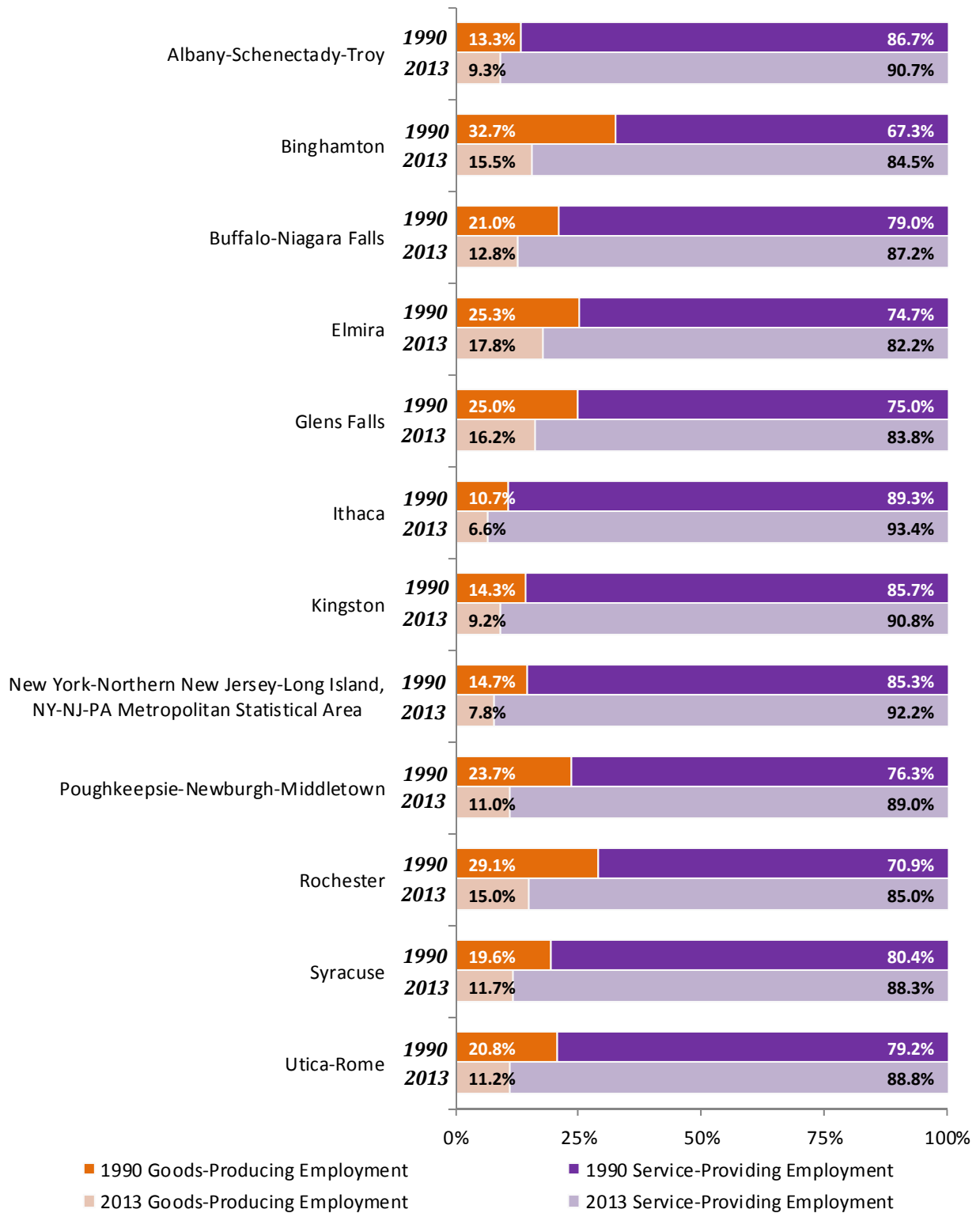

Goods-Producing Employment As a Share of Nonfarm Employment 2013

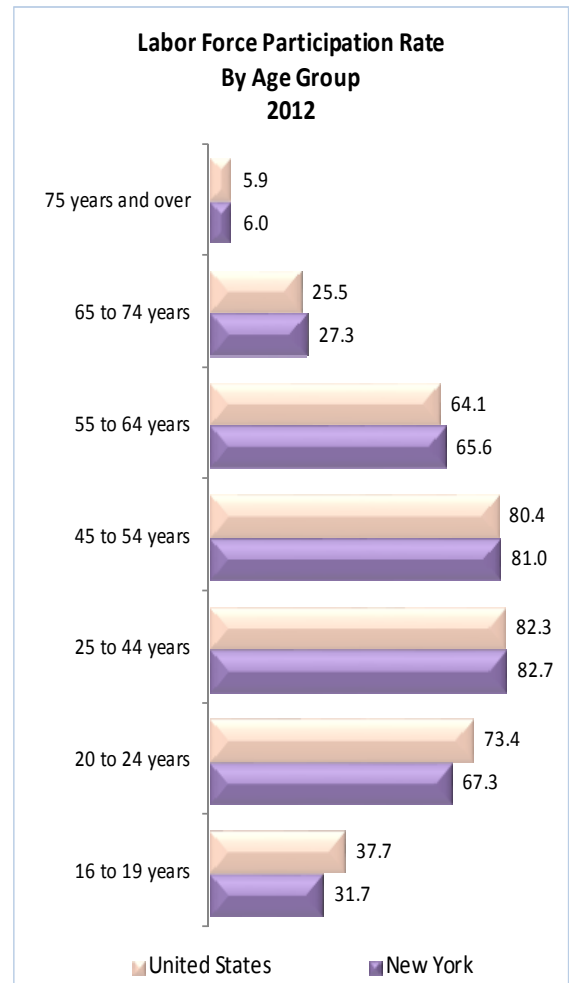
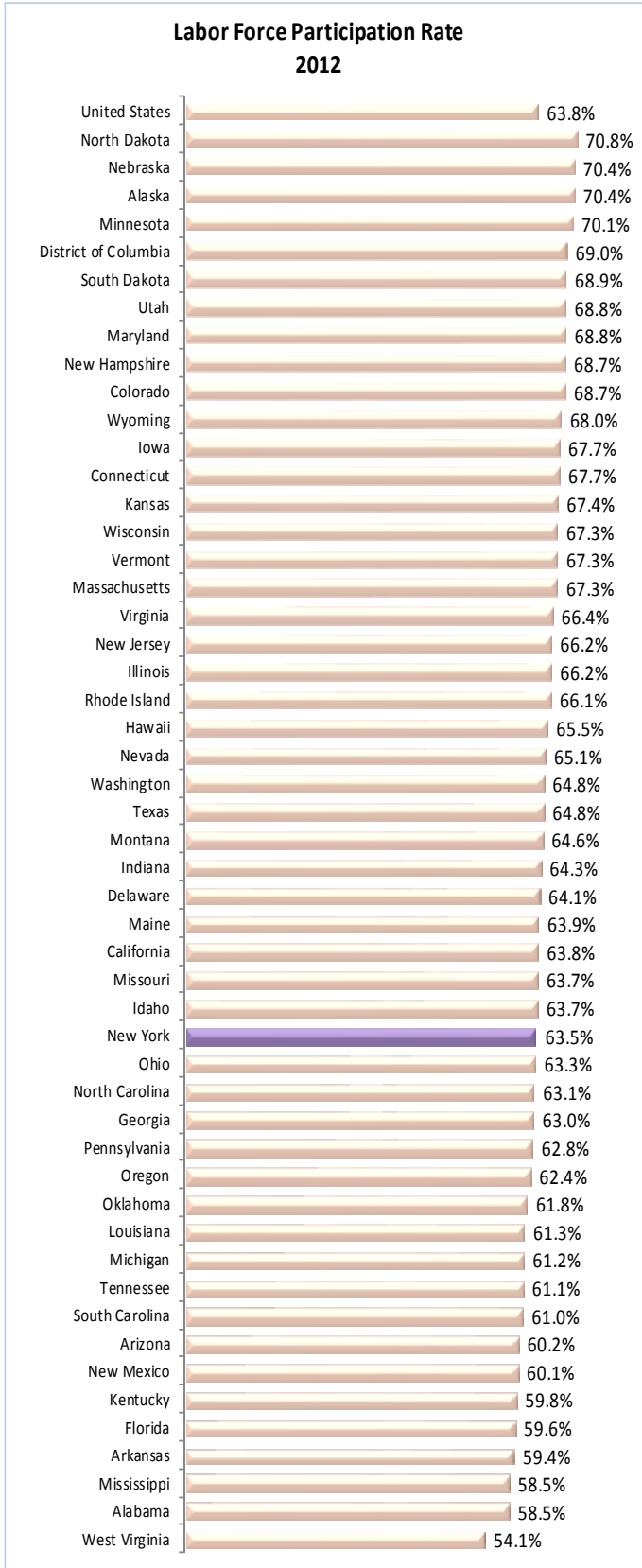

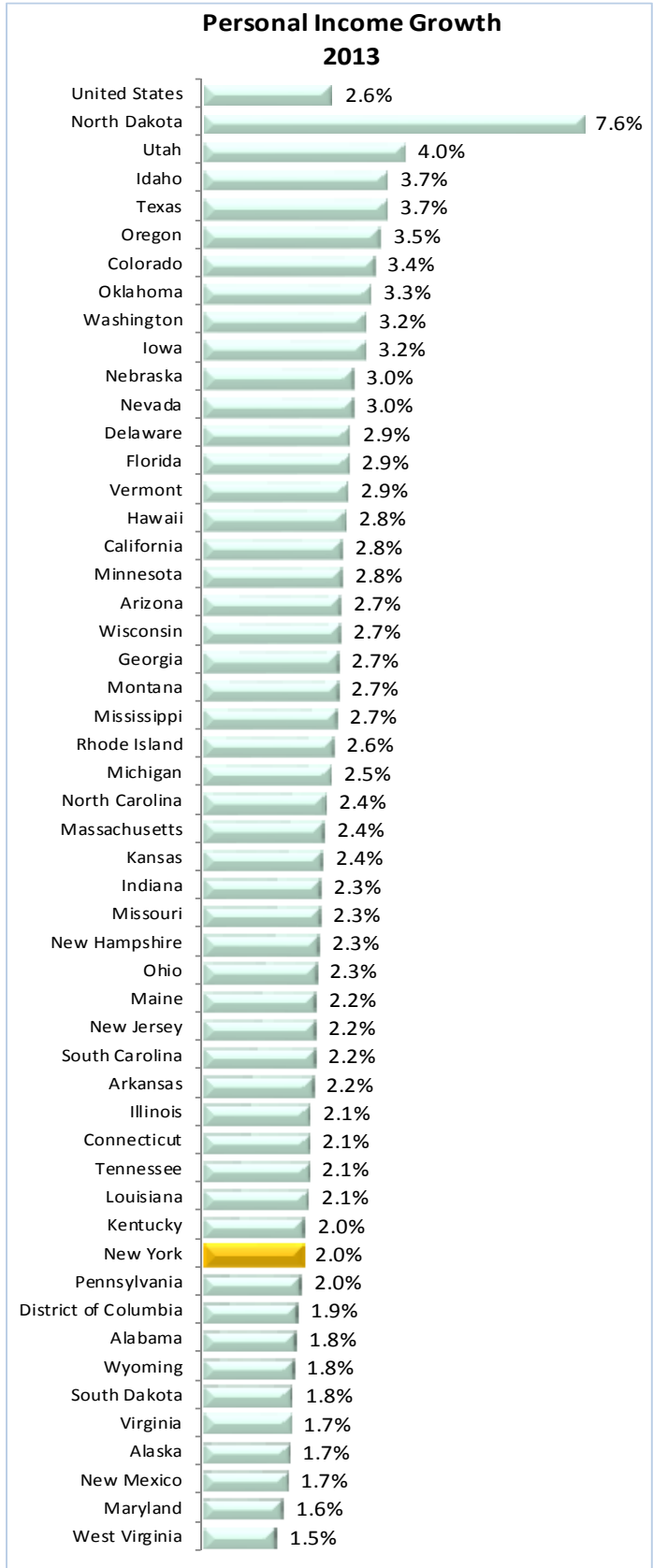

Per Capita Personal Income



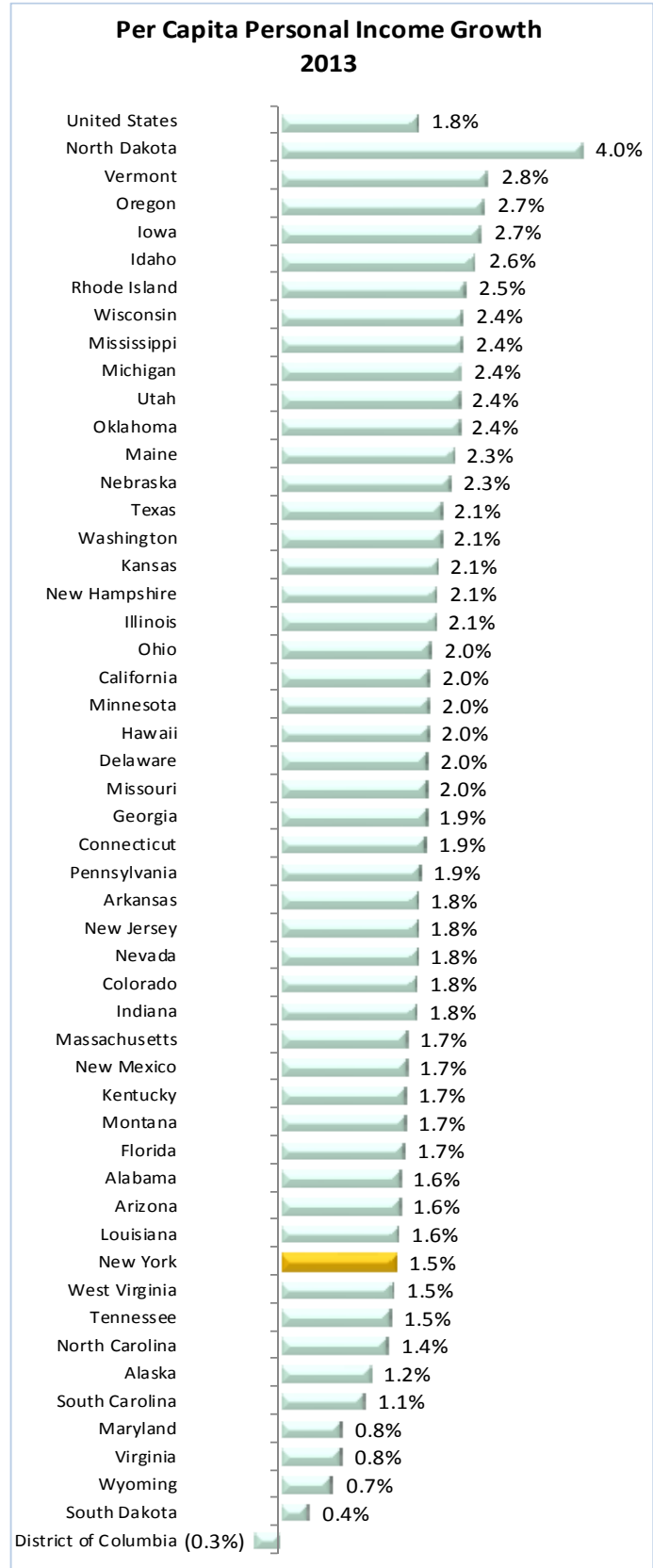

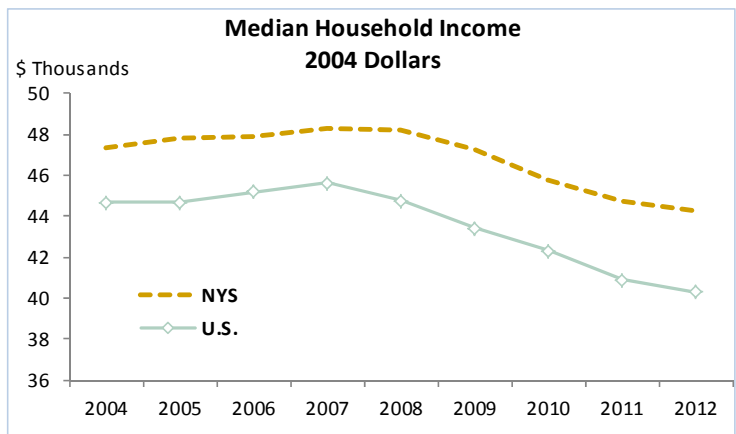

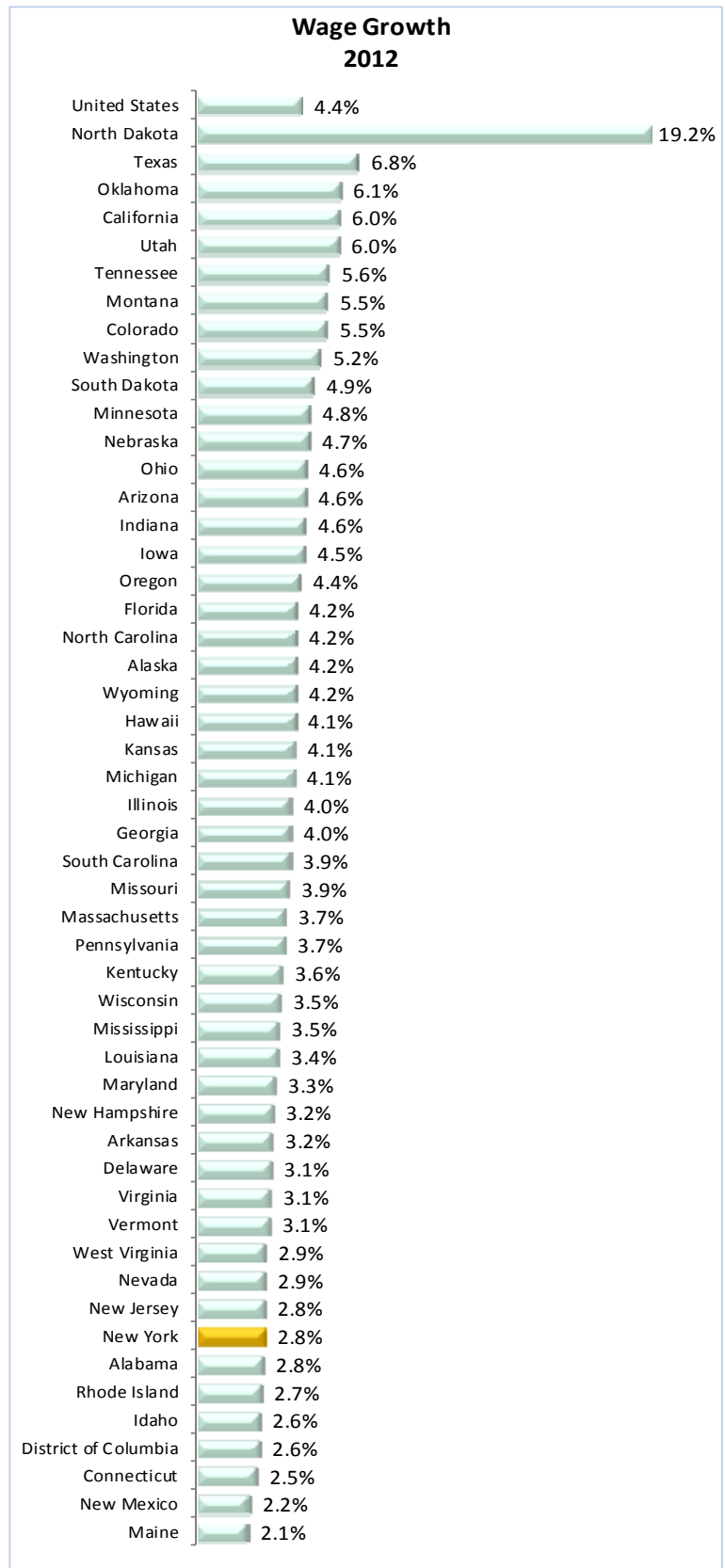
Median Household Income Growth 2012

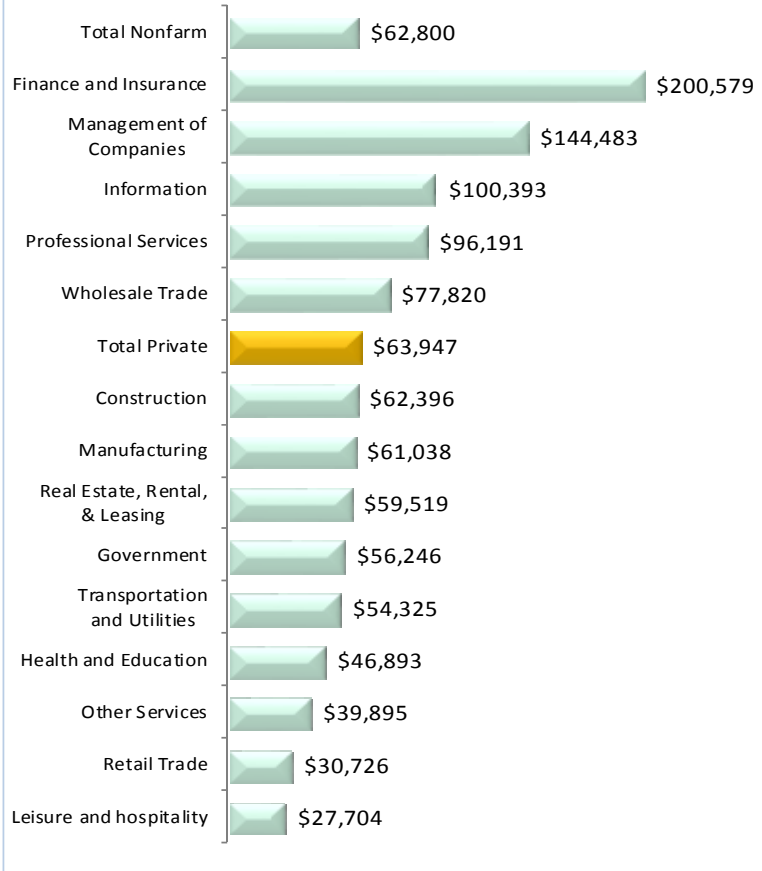

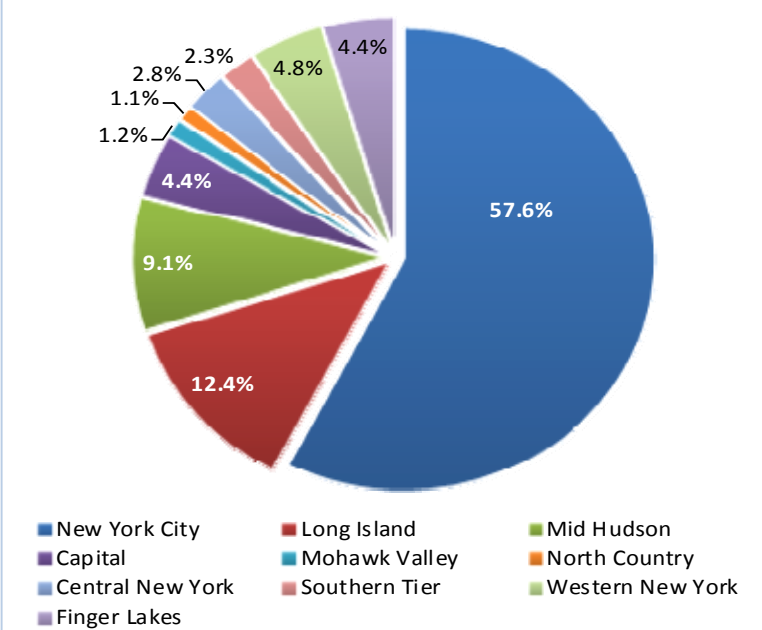

Regional Share of Total State Wages New York State, 2012



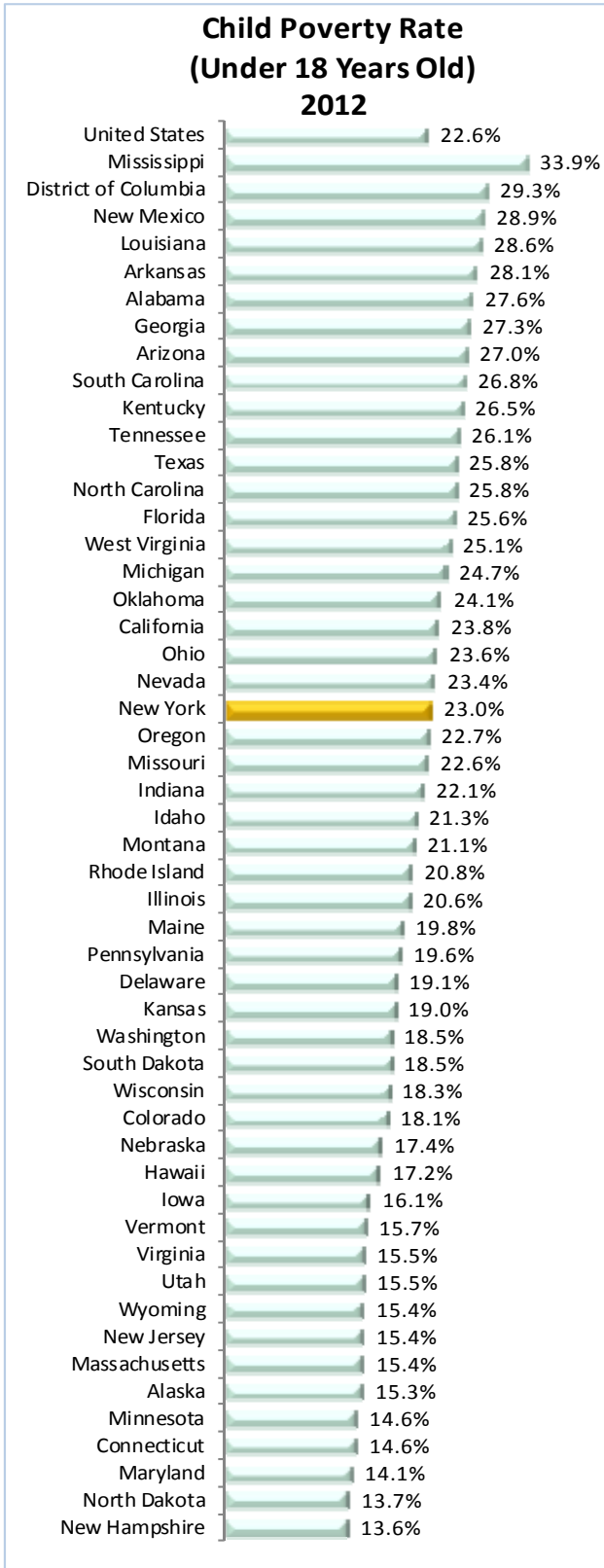
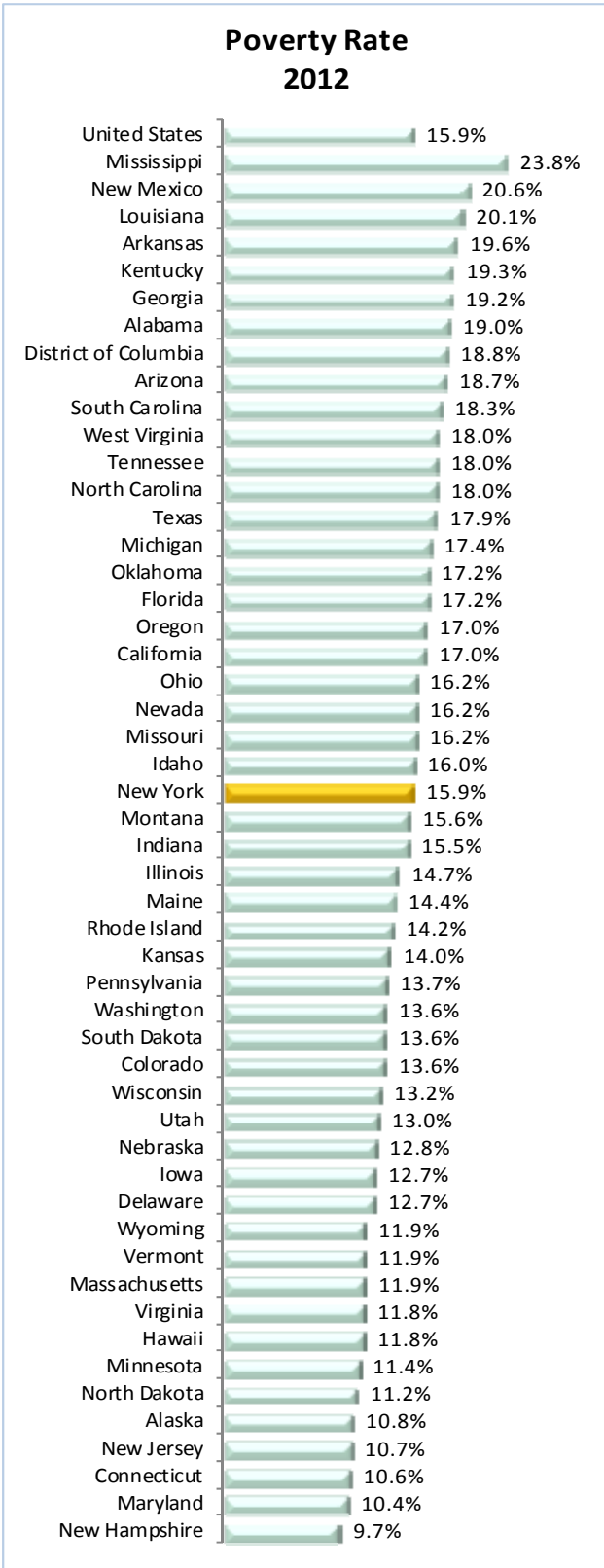

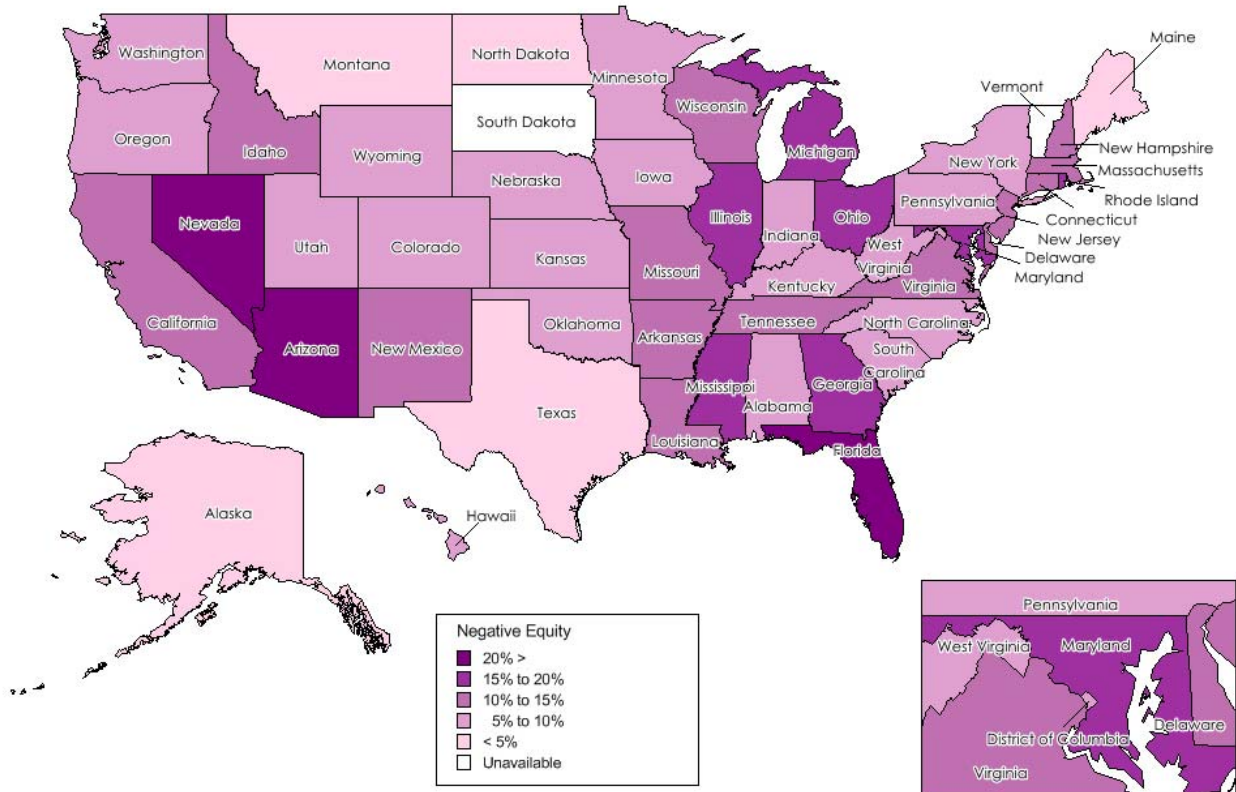

Foreclosure Inventory Percentage of All Mortgaged Homes February 2014



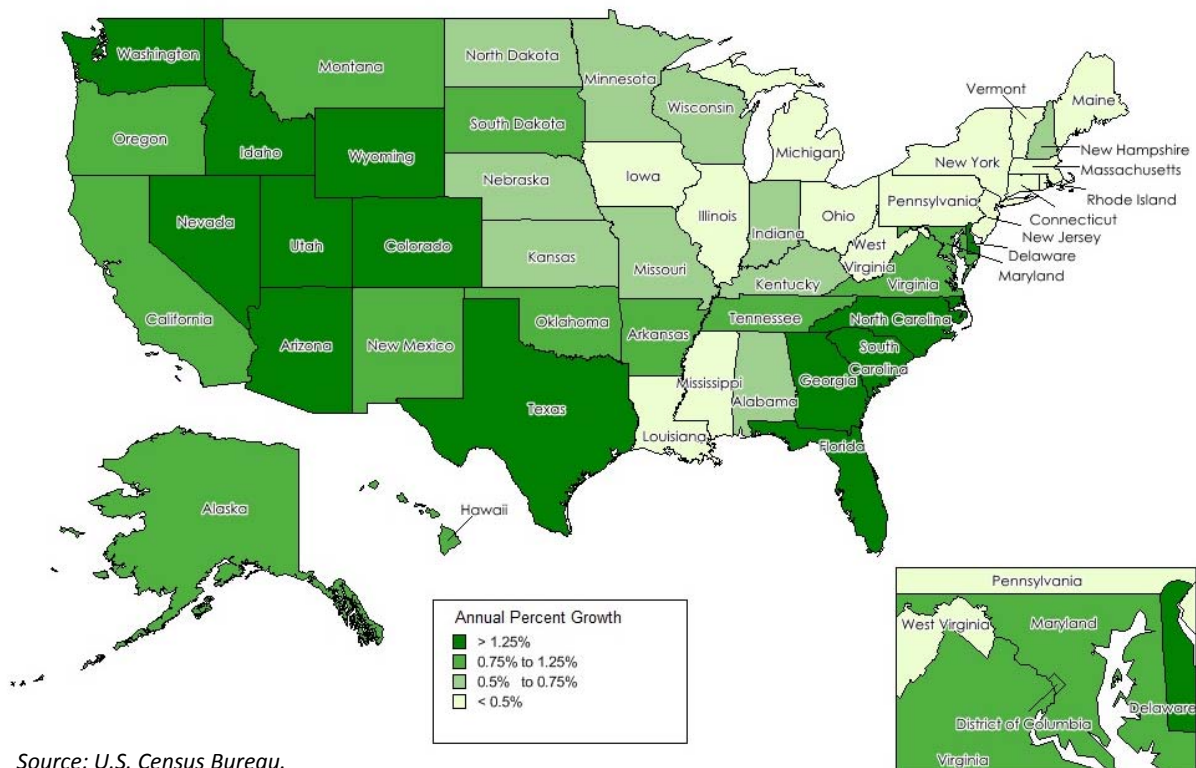

- New York State has comparatively more young adults than the U.S. as a whole.

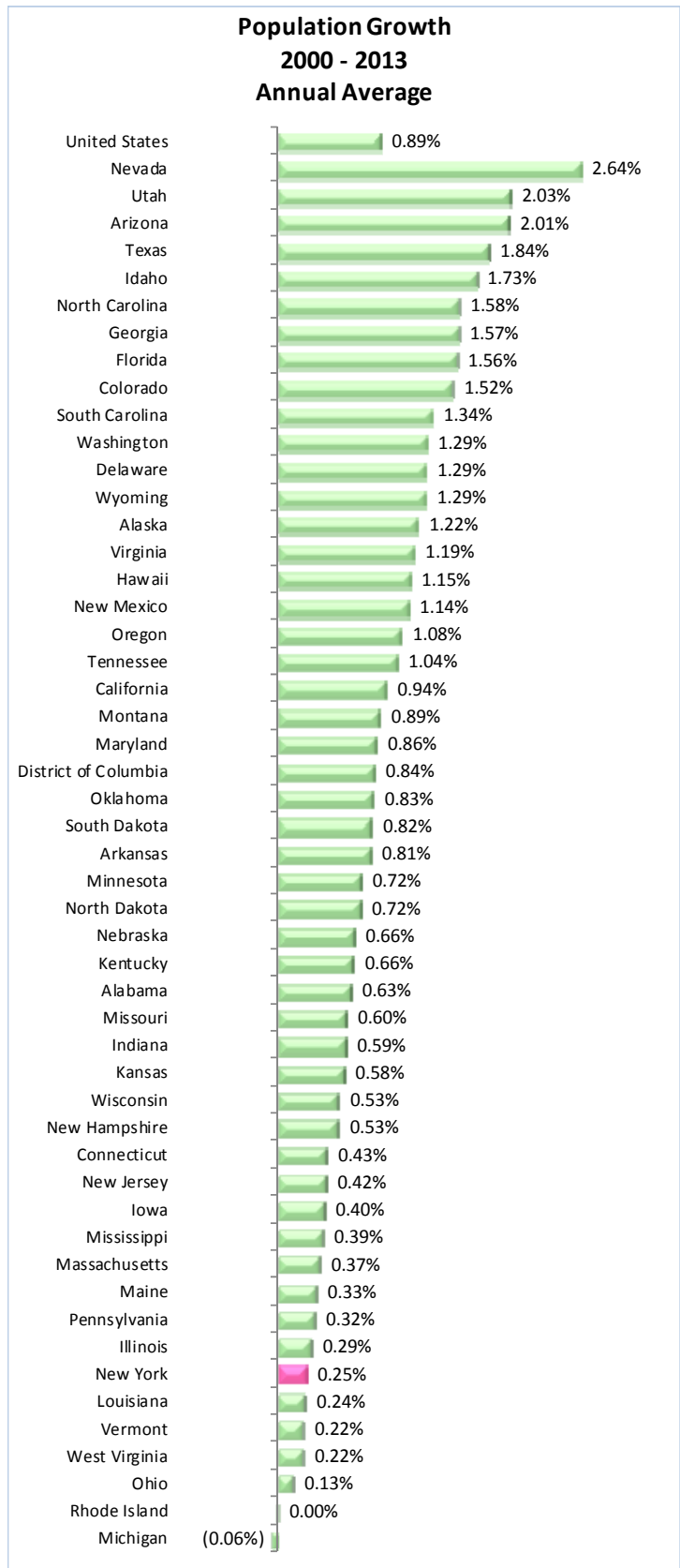

New York State Regional Net Migration Rates 2010-2012

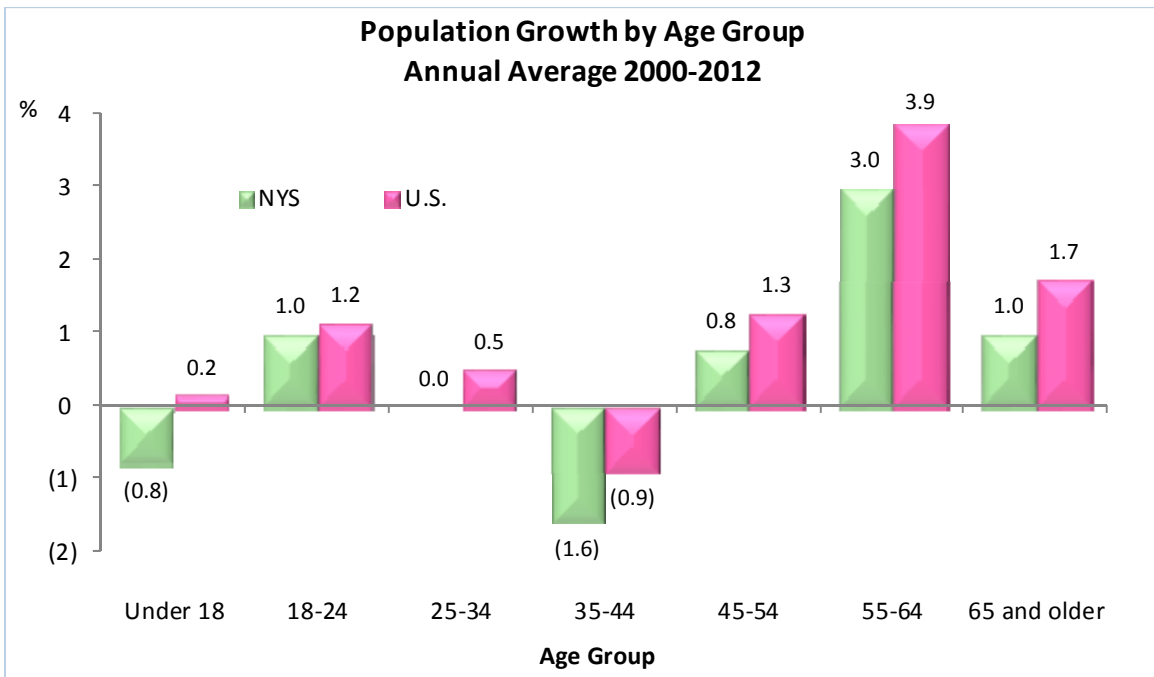
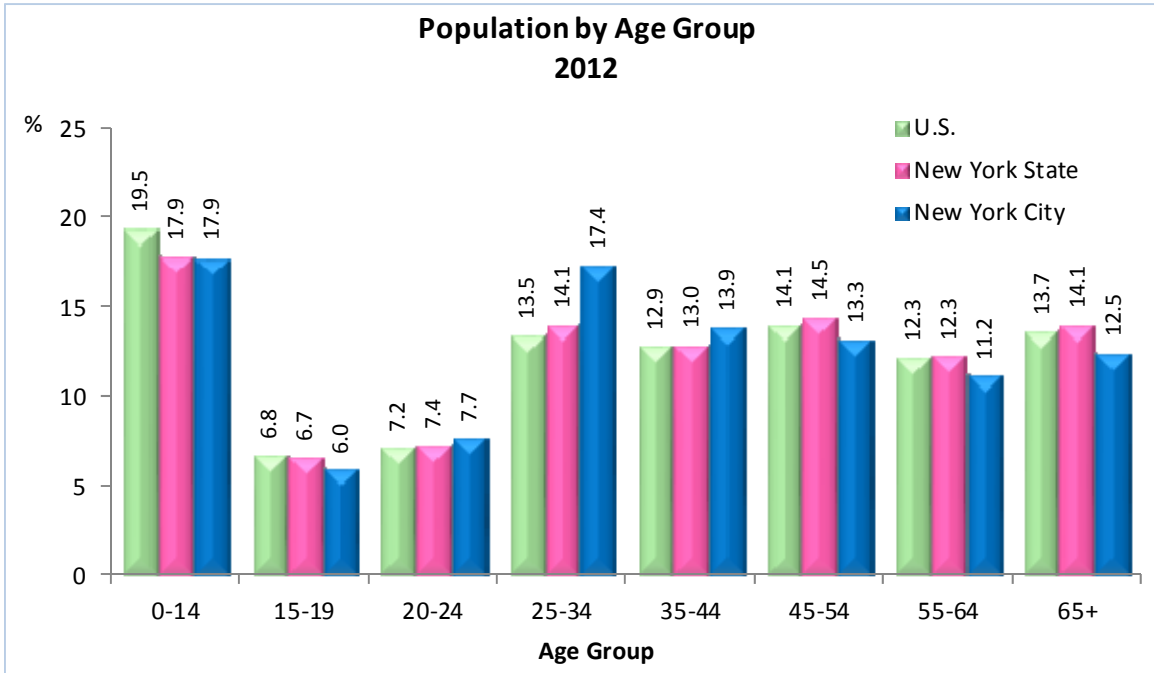

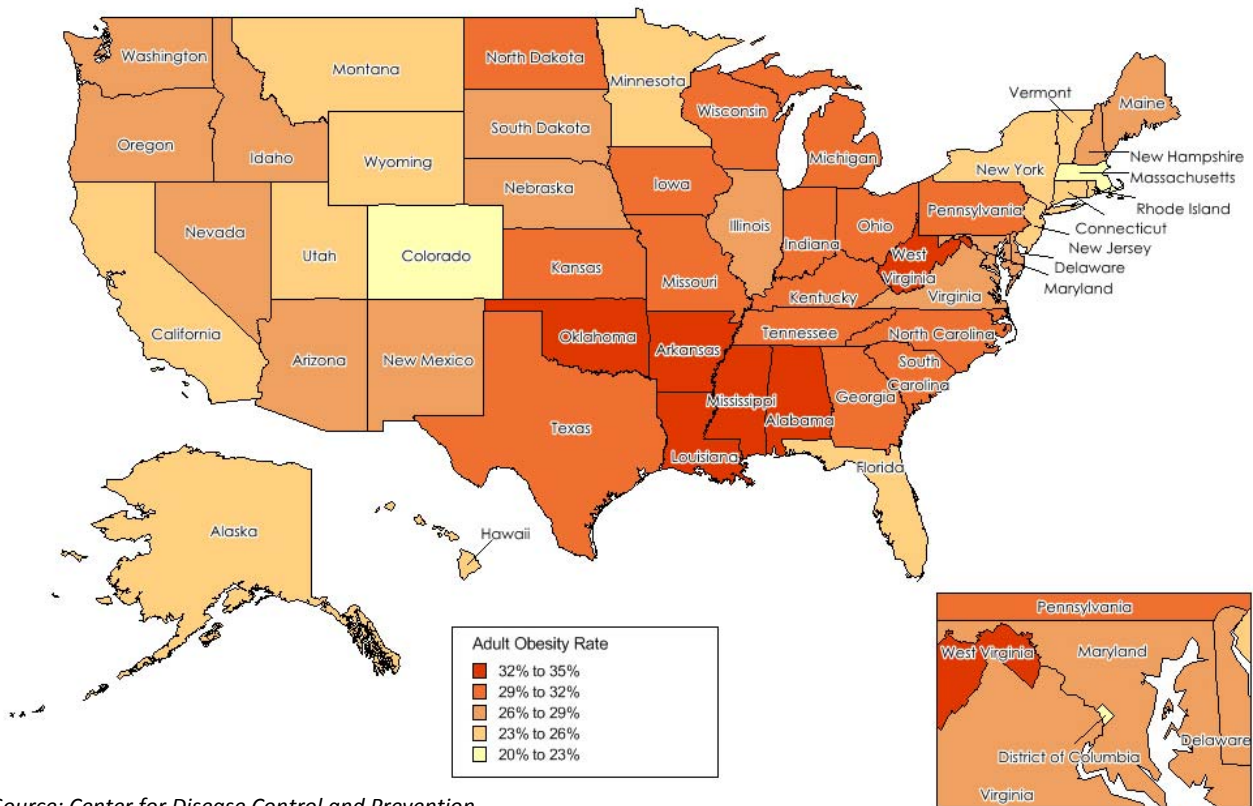

Active Physicians per 10,000 Civilian Population 2010

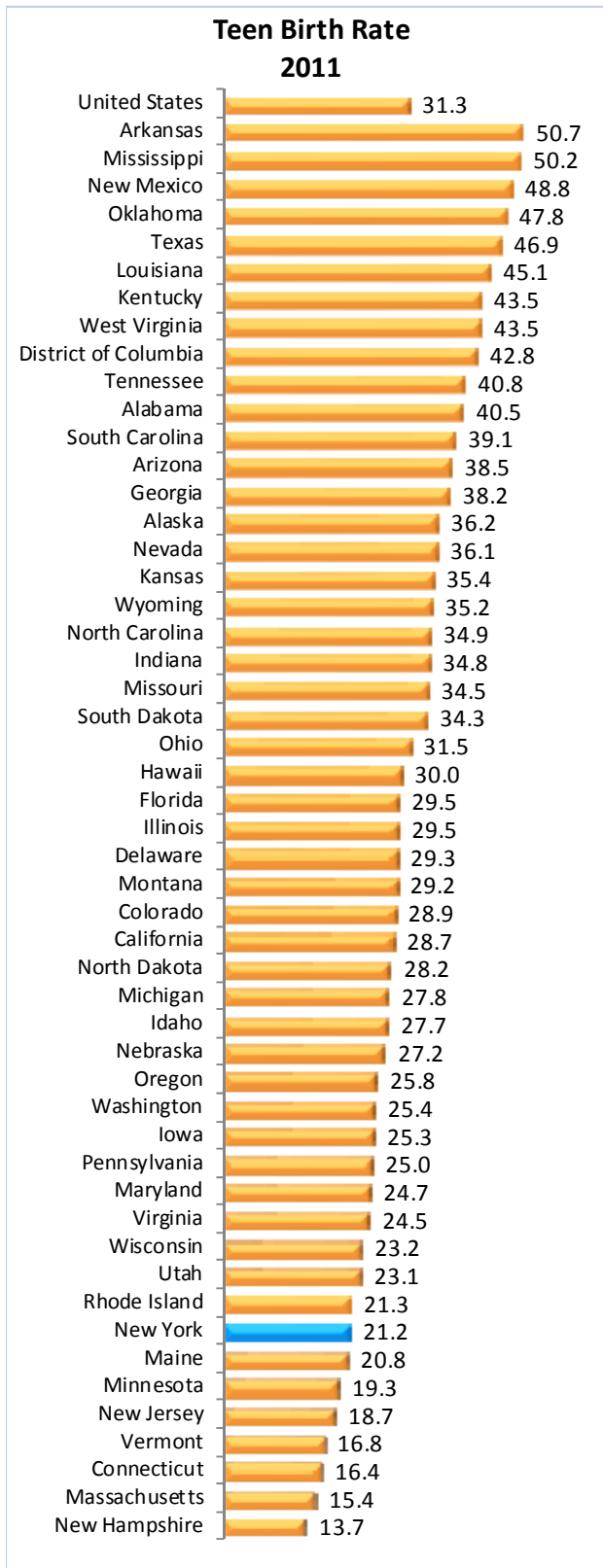

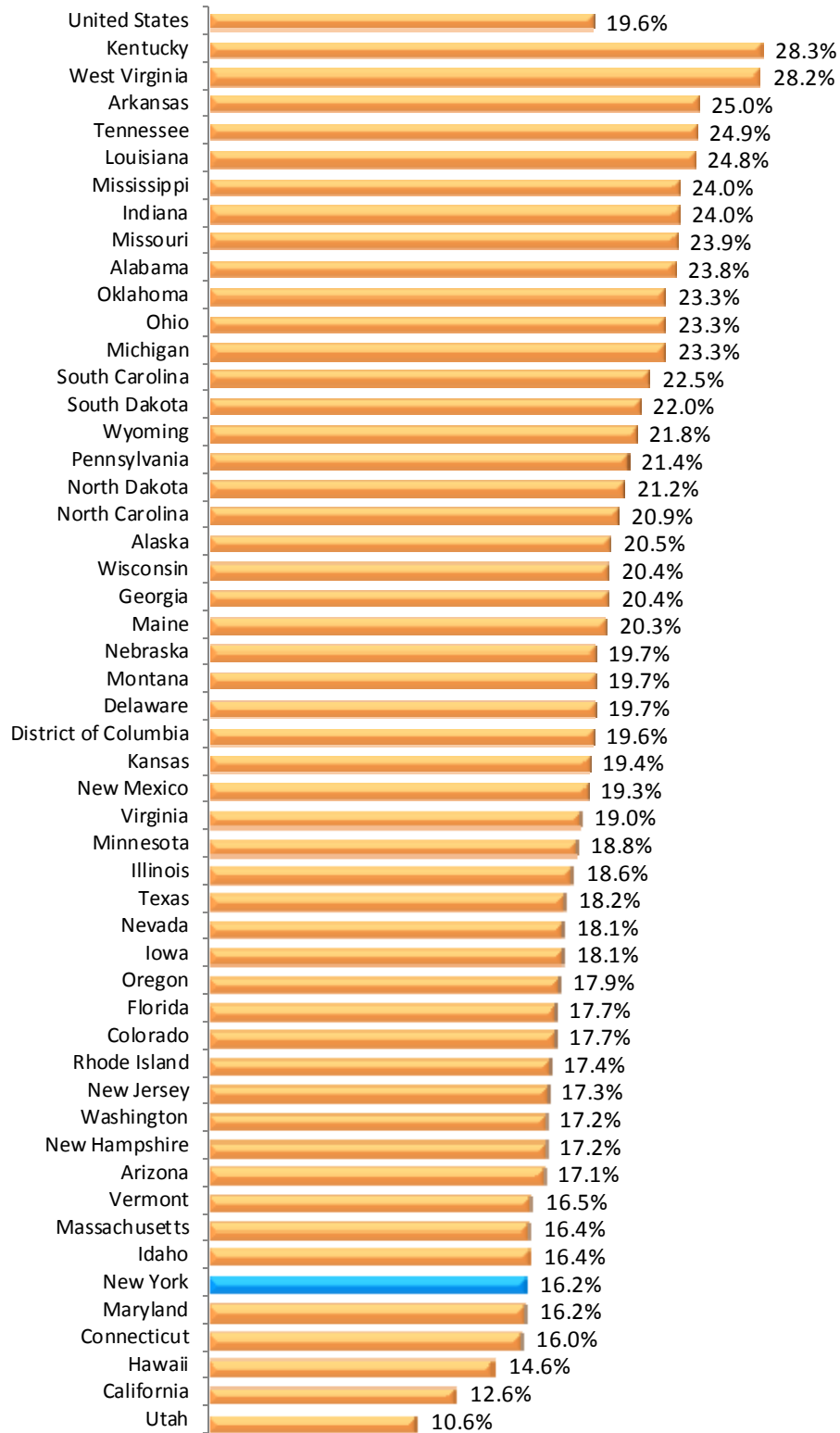

Percentage of Adults Using Cigarettes 2012

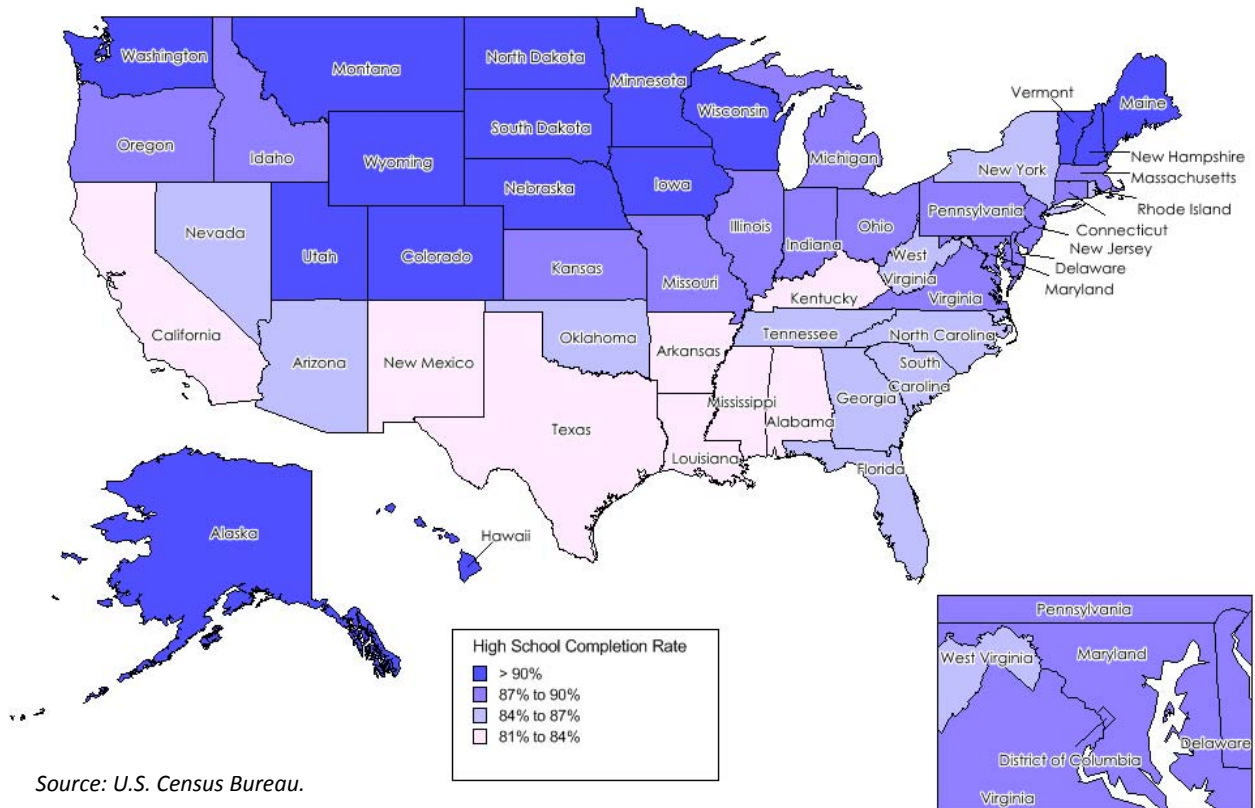

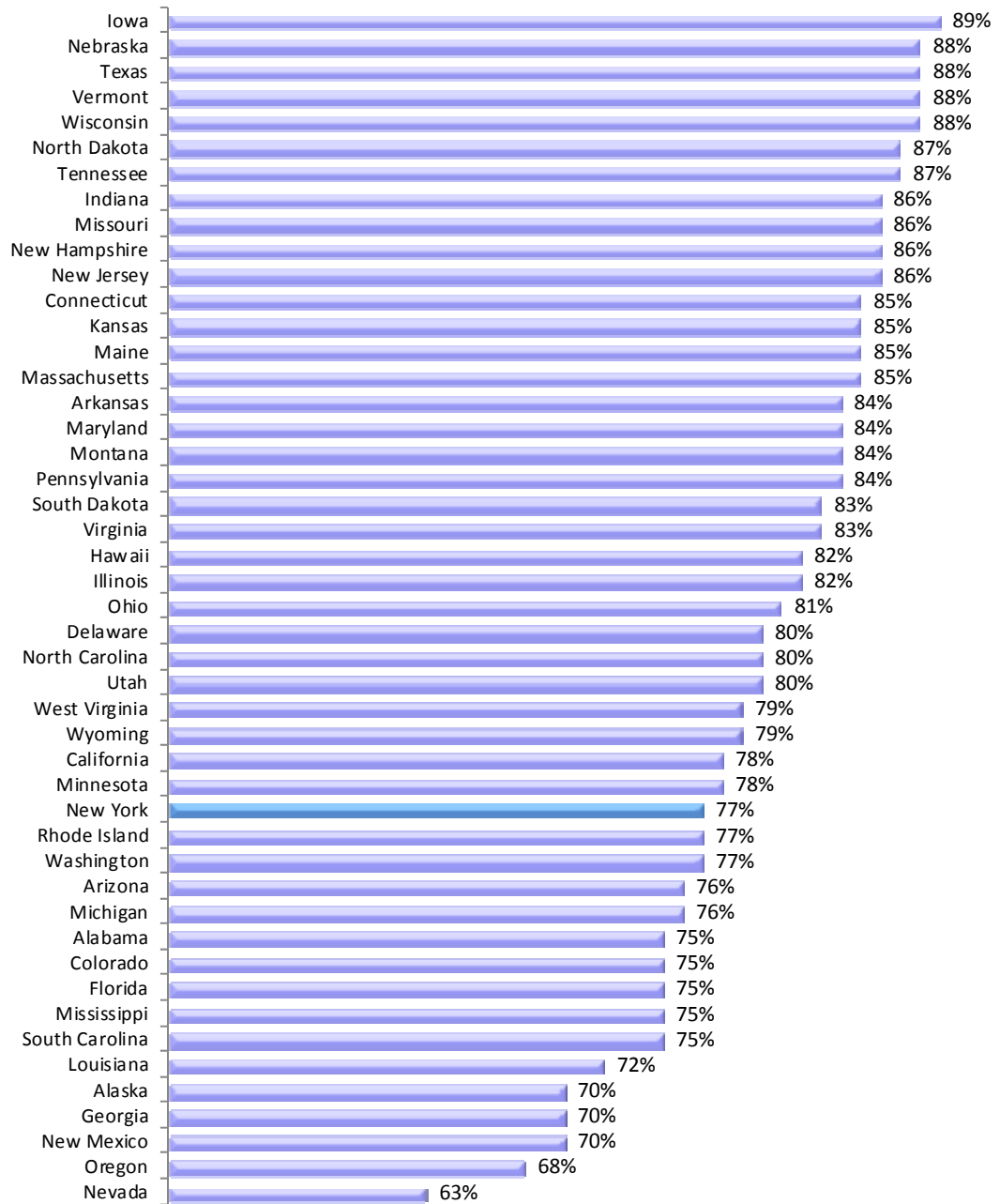

High School Completion Rate



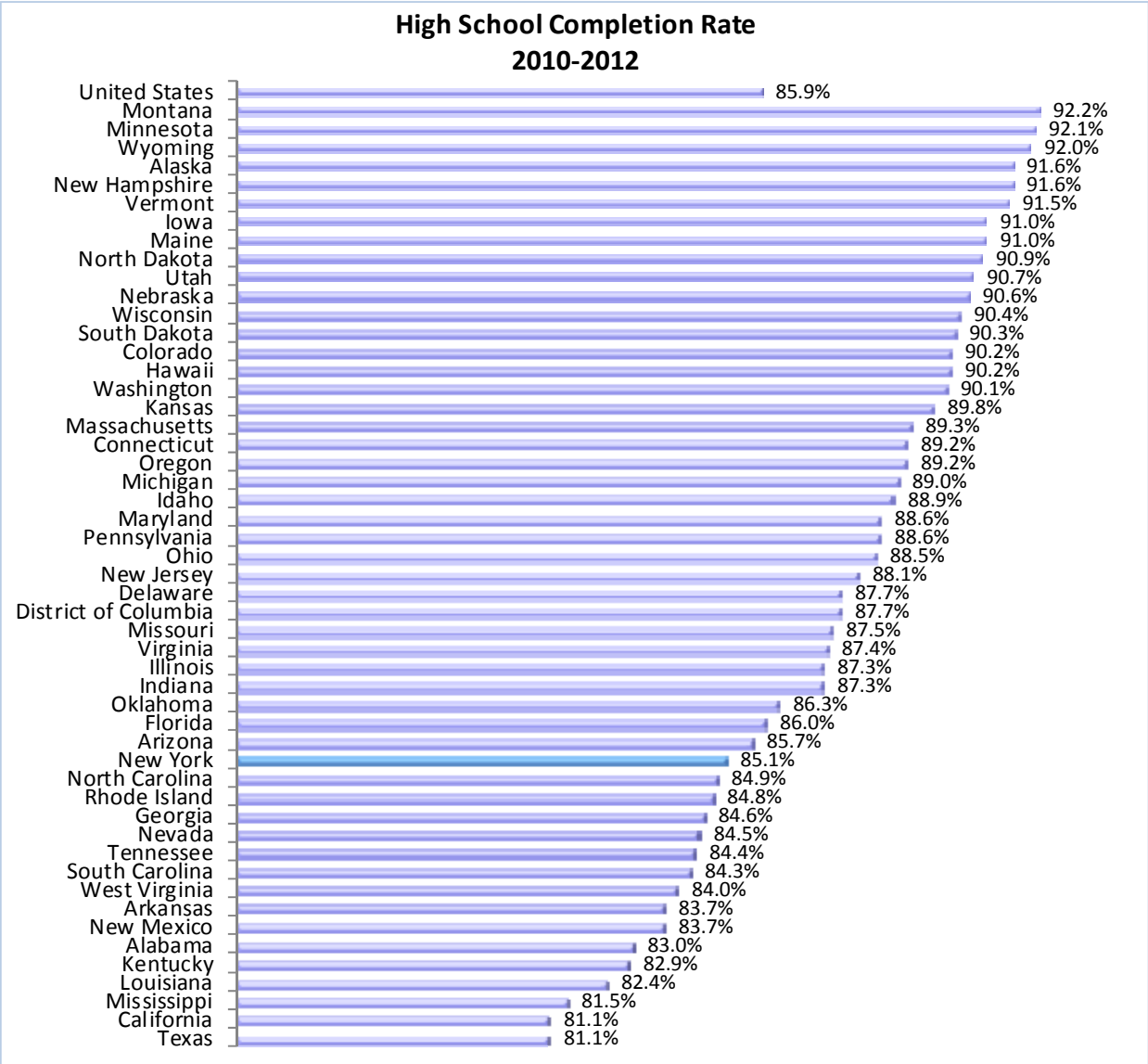

High School Graduation Rate 2011-2012

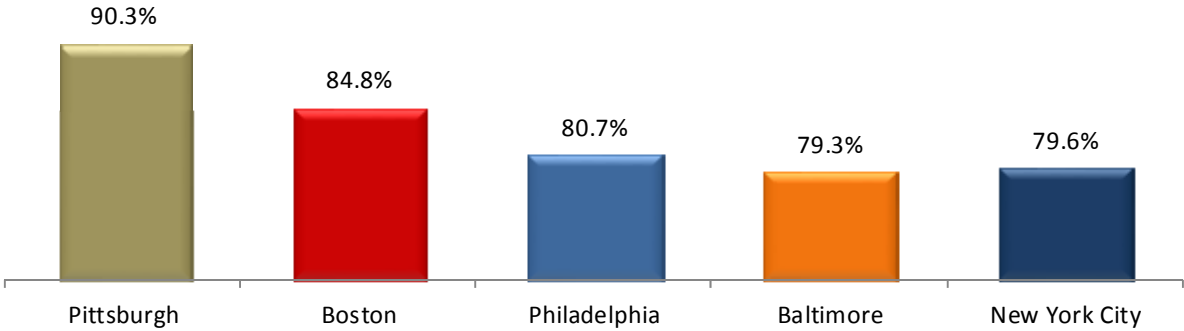

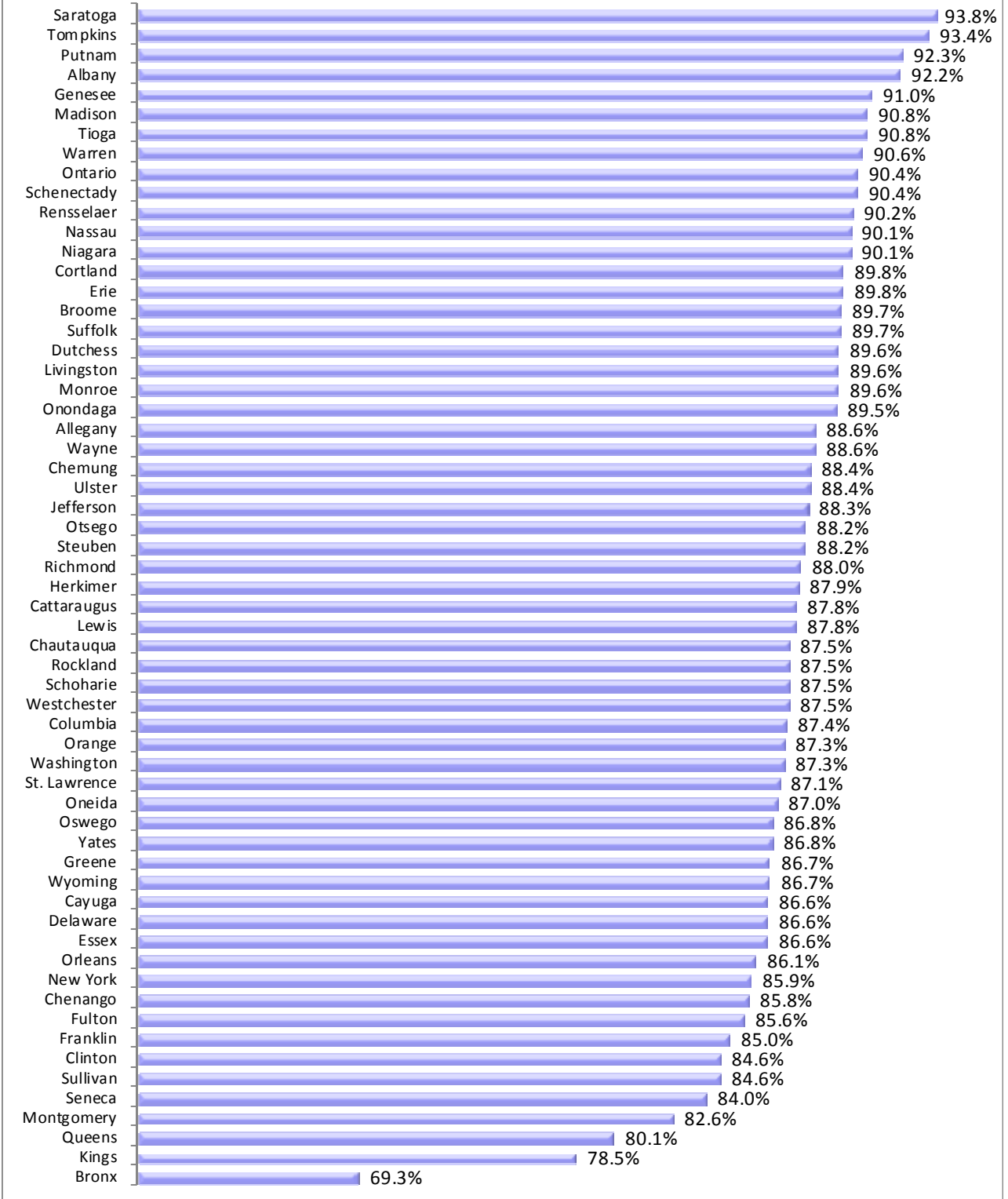
Comparing Select Northeast Cities

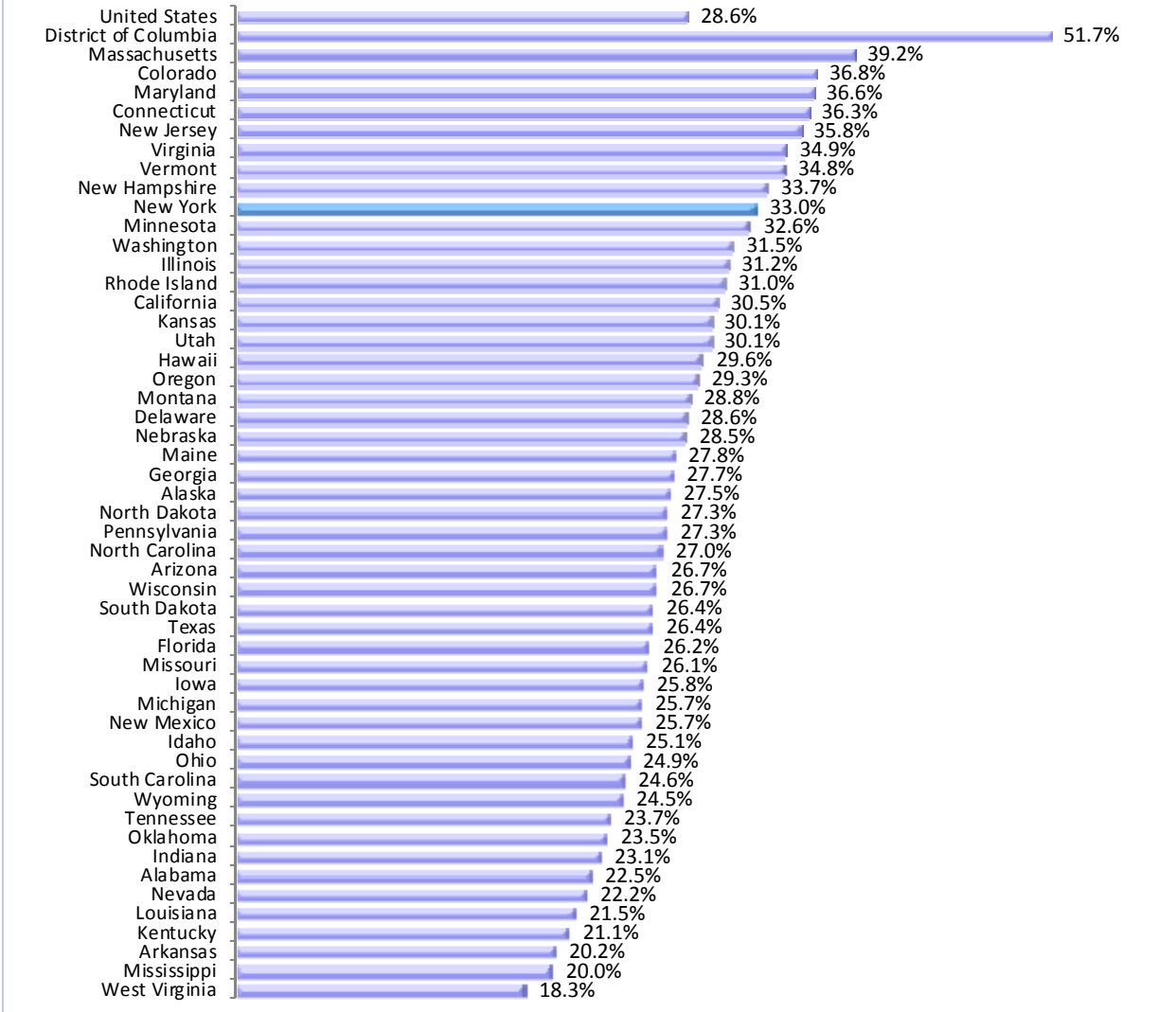
New York State High School Completion Rate by County 2010-2012



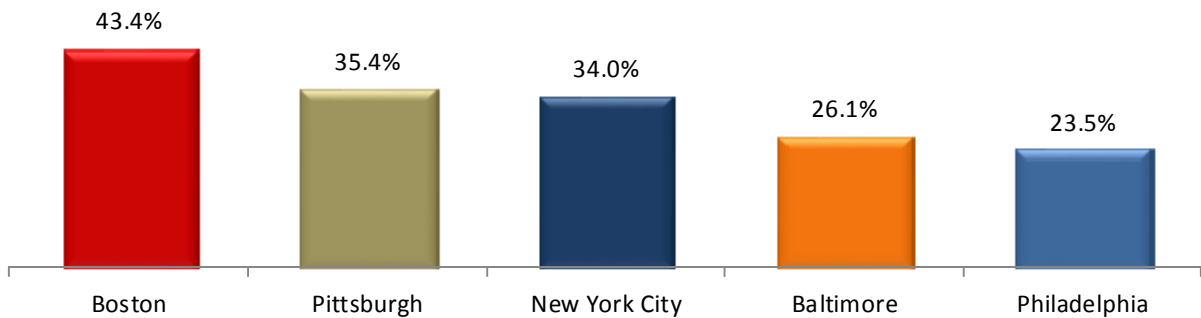

Comparing Select Northeast Cities Percentage of Population with a Bachelor's Degree 2010-2012



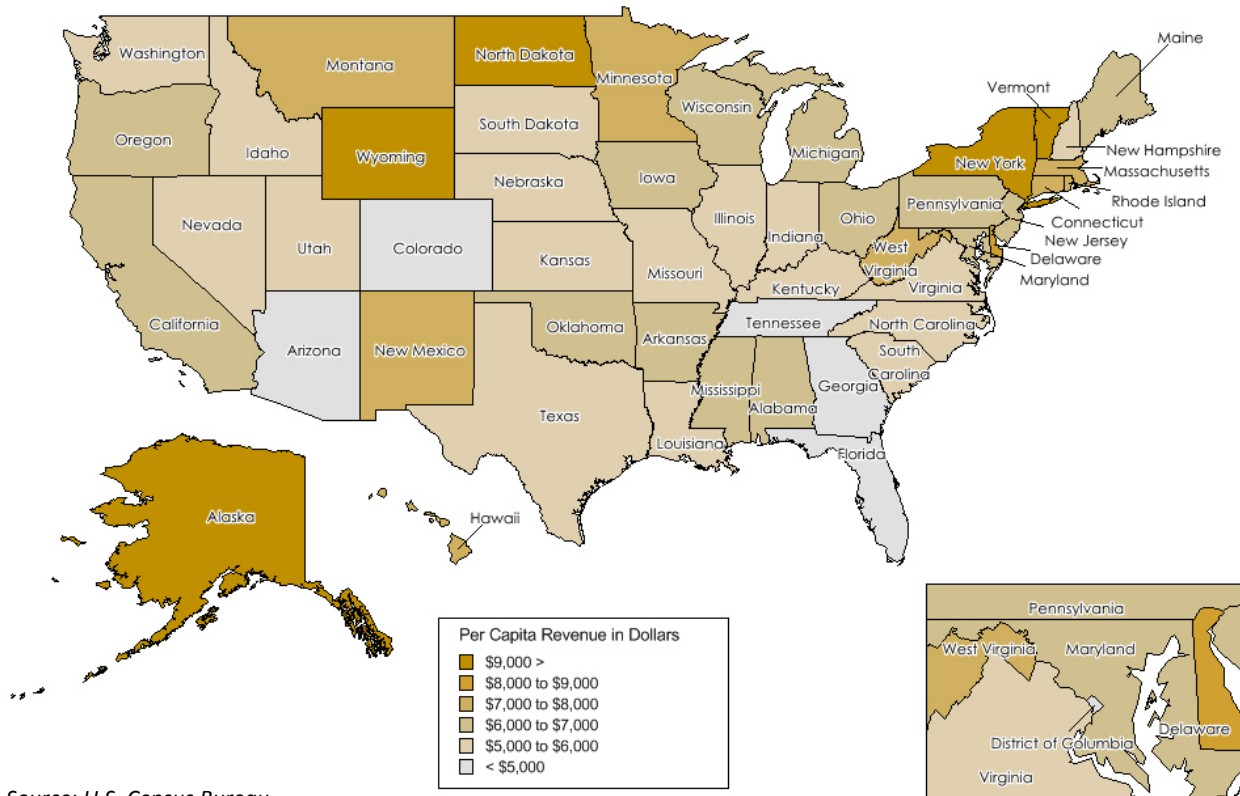

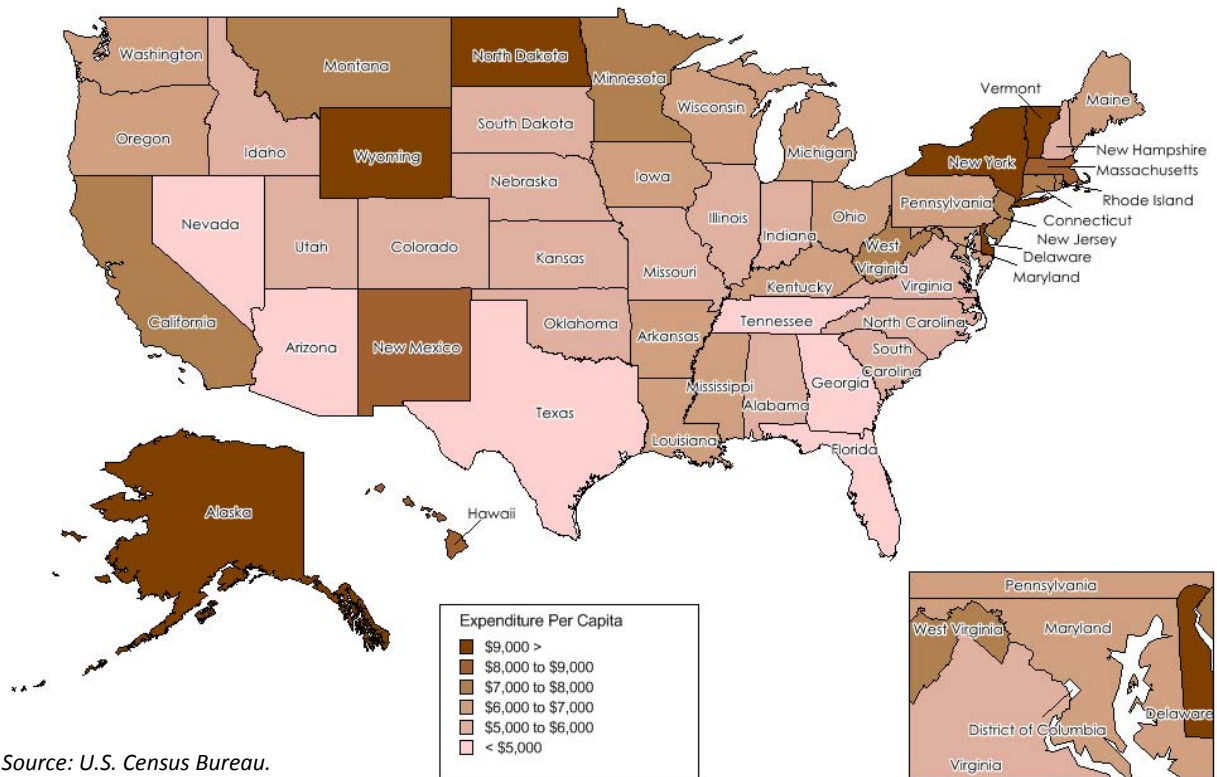

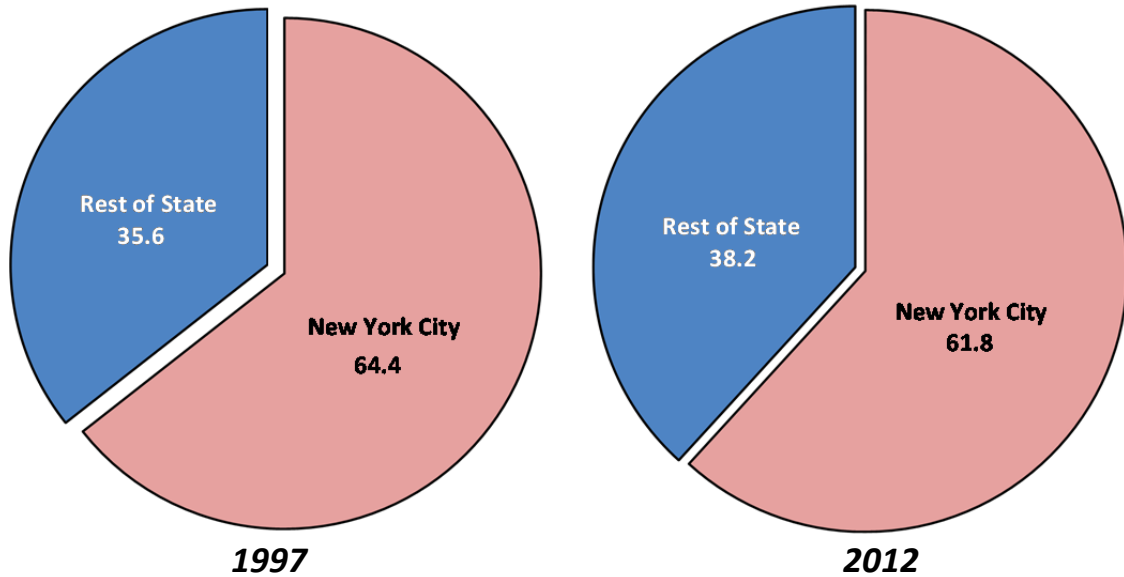
**Medicaid Enrollees by County
Percentage of Total Population**



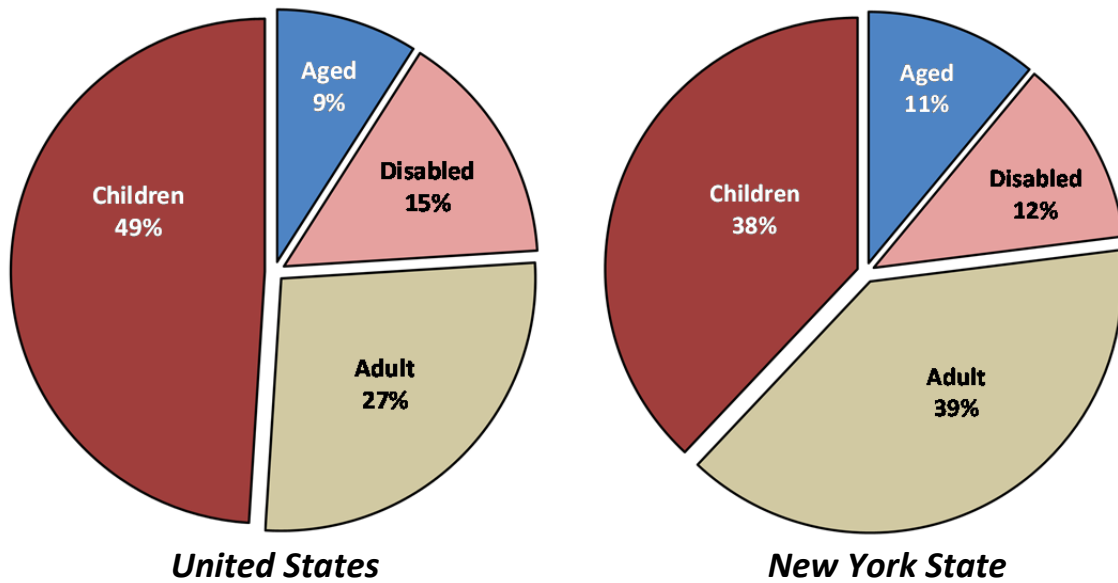

Distribution of Medicaid Enrollees by Enrollment Group Fiscal Year 2010



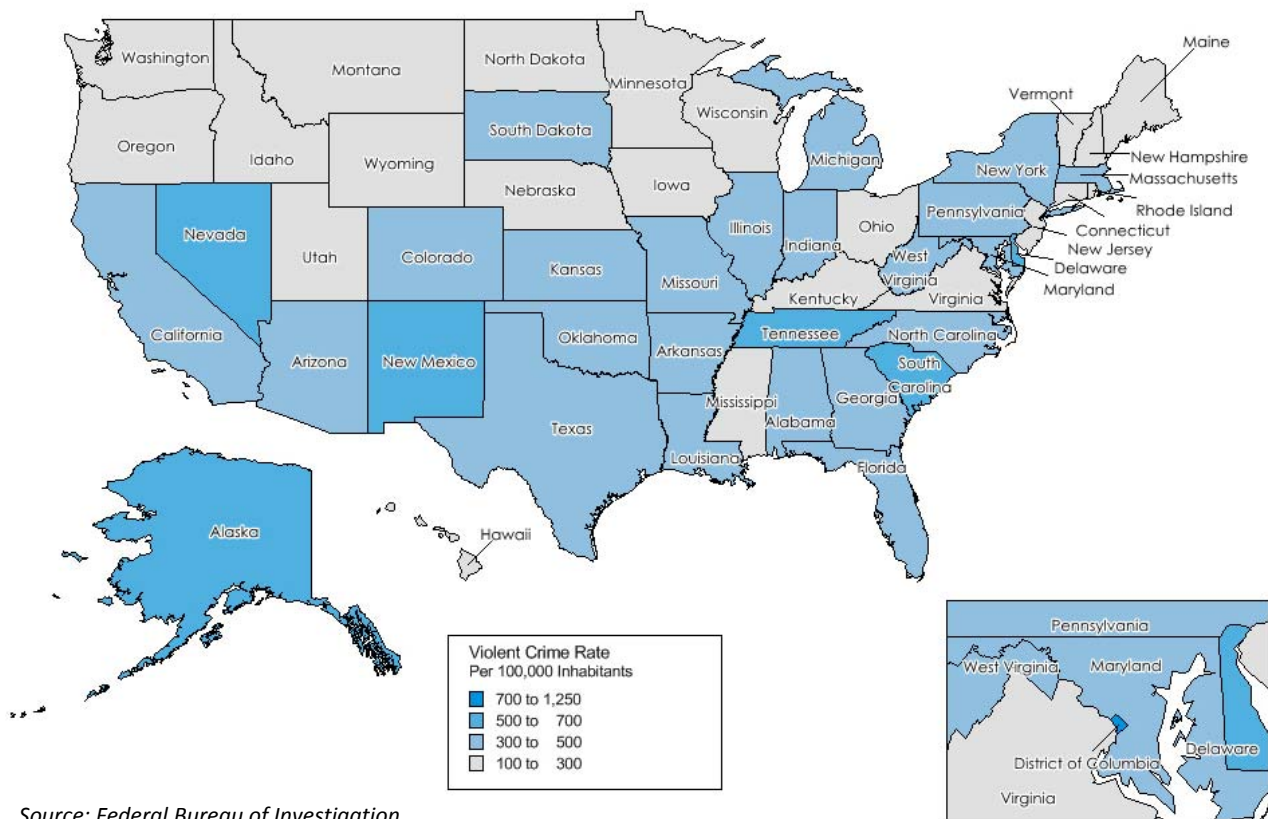

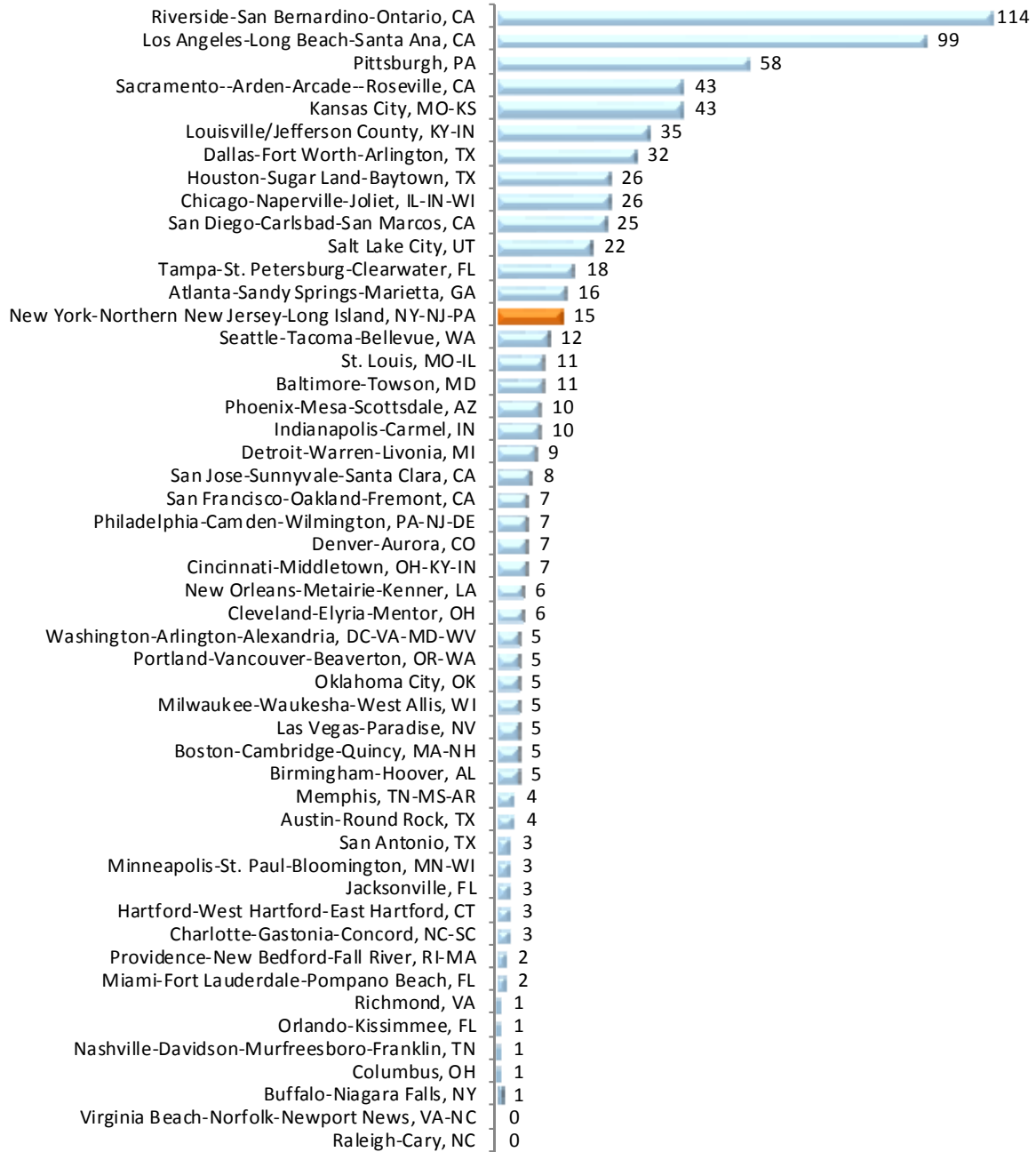
