NYS Dept. of Environmental Conservation, Hudson River Estuary Grants

These grants are for projects that will implement priorities of the Hudson River Estuary Action Agenda - to provide benefits of a vital estuary ecosystem: clean water; resilient communities; the sustainability of estuary fish, wildlife and habitats; conservation of natural scenery; and enhanced access, river education and recreational opportunities.

NYS Dept. of Economic Development, Regional Economic Development Councils (REDC), Consolidated Funding Application (CFA)

This funding empowers regional stakeholders to establish pathways to prosperity, mapped out in regional strategic plans and by making investments that enforce four interconnecting strategies:

- ◆ placemaking - in order to attract a talented workforce, the built environment must emphasize creating accessible job centers, sustainable infrastructure and livable communities
- ◆ workforce - targeted job training and education to ensure that jobs in high-paying, in-demand, tradeable sectors are filled in an equitable way
- ◆ tradeable sectors - the industries New York State is targeting to increase export-based employment opportunities; industry sectors that are part of a global market like manufacturing, agricultural products and energy
- ◆ innovation - the strategy of investing in and creating synergies between research and commercialization to drive the economy forward

US Dept. of Labor, Critical Sector Job Quality Grants

This funding will support transformative efforts to improve job quality and availability of good jobs, particularly for the benefit of historically marginalized populations and communities that have experienced barriers to employment. US Dept. of Justice, Emergency and Transitional Pet Shelter and Housing Assistance Grant Program

This funding will help provide shelter and transitional housing and other assistance to victims of domestic violence and their companion animals. Examples of program activities include purchasing kennels; installing pet amenities; partnering with veterinarians to provide medical care; assisting with housing relocation; providing pet boarding services; undertaking shelter modifications; and other activities related to providing services to support housing domestic violence victims and their pets together.

US Dept. of Justice, the Kevin and Avonte Program: Reducing Injury and Death of Missing Individuals with Dementia and Developmental Disabilities Grants

These grants will seek to reduce the number of deaths and injuries of individuals with forms of dementia (such as Alzheimer's disease) or developmental disabilities (such as autism) who, due to their condition, wander from safe environments. This program provides funding to law enforcement and other public safety agencies to implement location tracking technologies to help find missing individuals, to develop and/or operate programs to prevent wandering, increase vulnerable individuals' safety and facilitate rescues.

This funding helps local communities to integrate land use and transportation planning around a new fixed guideway or core capacity improvement project. Per statute, any comprehensive or site-specific planning funded through the program must examine ways to improve economic development and ridership, foster multimodal connectivity and accessibility, improve transit access for pedestrian and bicycle traffic, engage the private sector, identify infrastructure needs and enable mixed-use development near transit stations.

National Science Foundation (NSF), ADVANCE: Organizational Change for Gender Equity in STEM Academic Professions

This program provides grants to enhance the systemic factors that support equity and inclusion and to mitigate the systemic factors that create inequities in the academic profession and workplaces. The solicitation includes four funding tracks:

- ◆ IT track is designed to support the development, implementation and evaluation of innovative systemic change strategies that promote gender equity for STEM faculty within an institution of higher education
- ◆ adaptation track is designed to support the work

to adapt, implement and evaluate evidence-based systemic change strategies that have been shown to promote gender equity for STEM faculty in academic workplaces and the academic profession. Adaptation projects can either: 1) support the adaptation of evidence-based systemic change strategies to promote equity for STEM faculty within an institution of higher education; or 2) facilitate national or regional STEM disciplinary transformation by adapting evidence-based systemic change strategies to non-profit, non-academic organizations

- ◆ partnership track is designed to support the work to facilitate the broader adaptation of gender equity and systemic change strategies. Partnership projects are expected to result in national or regional transformation in STEM academic workplaces and the academic profession and demonstrate significant reach. Partnership projects can focus on the transformation of institutions and organizations and/or the transformation within one or more STEM disciplines
- ◆ catalyst track is designed to broaden the types of IHEs that are able to undertake data collection and institutional self-assessment work to identify systemic gender inequities impacting their STEM faculty so that these can be addressed by the institution
- **Eligible Applicants:** Institutions of higher education (IHEs): non-profit two- and four-year IHEs (including community colleges) accredited in, and having a campus located in the U.S., acting on behalf of their faculty members. Special instructions for international branch campuses of U.S. IHEs: If the proposal includes funding to be provided to an international branch campus of a U.S. institution of higher education (including through use of subawards and consultant arrangements), the proposer must explain the benefit(s) to the project of performance at the international branch campus and justify why the project activities cannot be performed at the U.S. campus. Non-profit, non-academic organizations: independent museums, observatories, research laboratories, professional societies and similar organizations located in the U.S. that are directly associated with educational or research activities

On the Private Level...

Morgan Stanley Foundation, Alliance for Children's Mental Health Innovation Awards program

This funding, for new or piloted projects from direct-service organizations, will help address the far-reaching

challenge of stress, anxiety, depression, or other mental health issues in children and young adults in the United States. Projects must tackle specific issues and address unmet needs to reduce stigma, increase access to care, improve equity in mental health, or enable early identification/prevention or enhance intervention, especially among disadvantaged and vulnerable populations.

- **Eligible Applicants:** While all registered 501(c)(3) public charities based in the U.S. are eligible to apply to the program, this program is focused primarily on those with an annual total revenue under \$5 million. Applicants with an annual total revenue over \$5 million must demonstrate why existing funds cannot be used to support the proposed initiative

National Forest Foundation, Collaborative Capacity Program (CCP) for Forests and Communities

This funding aims to provide resources, invest in skills and tools and support activities that make tribal co-stewardship and collaboration for forest stewardship successful. In addition to benefiting National Forest System lands, CCP has three main objectives: 1) to increase and improve the capacity for collaboration between tribes and other strategic partners and the forest service to achieve long-term stewardship outcomes that benefit national forests and grasslands; 2) ensure more inclusive and equitable collaboration by centering tribal nations and historically excluded and underserved communities in their efforts to participate, lead and design collaborative efforts with the forest service and other strategic partners; and 3) support the exchange of information and amplify lessons and best practices for equitable and inclusive collaboration, increasing collaborative capacity, storytelling and measuring success, with the broader collaborative stewardship field of practice.

A few examples of stewardship outcomes include the implementation of restoration plans in post-fire areas, building more accessible trails, or conducting erosion control work to improve stream and watershed health. Eligible collaborative efforts must describe how investments in collaboration will support a long-term strategy for achieving stewardship outcomes into the future and these outcomes must seek to benefit National Forest System lands. There are two funding pathways:

- ◆ **tribal applicants pathway:** there are several ways that federally recognized tribes engage with the forest service, including government-to-government consultation, collaboration, or even formal agreements, such as co-stewardship agreements. The Forest Service's Tribal Action Plan directly states how tribal sovereignty, in relation to public

lands management and national forests, entails the recognition of tribal nations and their rights to participate in decision-making processes regarding lands that hold cultural, historical and spiritual significance to them. Applications for the tribal applicant pathway will be considered from federally recognized tribal governments and organizations

- ◆ **all applicants pathway:** designed to support all other applicants. This funding pathway focuses on adding capacity where it is missing and supporting collaborative groups in evolving to take on more intersectional approaches. Applications to this funding pathway will be considered from nonprofit organizations, local governmental entities, state-recognized tribal governments and colleges and universities

NDN Collective, Community Self-Determination Grants

These grants invest in the self-determination of Indigenous people working in their community to defend, develop and decolonize, as well as for the fortification of self-determined efforts to create a just, equitable and sustainable world for all people and Mother Earth. Applicants are encouraged to describe community self-determination efforts within one of the following strategic focus areas:

- ◆ **Defend:** Indigenous Peoples, communities and nations defend and protect the land, air, water and natural resources. Efforts may include but are not limited to protecting sovereignty, landback efforts, water and natural resources
- ◆ **Develop:** Indigenous Peoples, communities and nations are developed in a resilient, regenerative and sustainable manner based on their values and connection to land, culture and identity. Efforts may include but are not limited to community and economic development/resilience based on sustainable, regenerative principles, climate change solutions and mitigation
- ◆ **Decolonize:** Indigenous ceremonies, cultures, languages and ways of life are revitalized, recognized and celebrated. Efforts may include, but are not limited to reclamation, transmission and continuity of language, culture, ceremonial practices, traditional governance and decision-making structures and lifeways
- **Eligible Applicants:** include Indigenous communities across Turtle Island, also known as North America, and related Island Nations. This includes Tribes, First Nations, Inuit, Metis and Indigenous-led nonprofit organizations across the post-colonial borders of





Canada; Mexico; the continental United States; Alaska; and the Island Nations of Hawai'i, Borikén/Puerto Rico, American Samoa, Guam, the Northern Mariana Islands and the U.S. Virgin Islands

Morris Animal Foundation, Canine Aging Research Grants

These grants will help fund research on canine aging and age-related diseases (excluding cancer). Topics of interest related to the canine aging process include (but are not limited to) physiological changes to the immune system, mitochondrial dysfunction, epigenetic alterations, genomic instability, and stem cell exhaustion. Examples of age-related diseases include (but are not limited to) osteoarthritis, cognitive decline, obesity-related diseases and chronic kidney disease.

There are three categories of awards:

- ◆ **established investigator:** will have a record of expertise demonstrated through peer-reviewed publications. While there is no limit of the budget request in this category, the foundation expects the average award to be approximately \$100,000 for a maximum duration of 36 months
- ◆ **first award:** designed to assist early career researchers in establishing a successful research program by supporting their first award as an independent investigator. The applicant must have completed a PhD, DVSc, DVM, or equivalent degree and have a permanent position in a university, accredited zoo, conservation organization, or a non-academic equivalent. Principal investigators should have a history of research publication as a Co-PI or Co-Investigator. This application requires supporting statements from one or more appropriately experienced mentors. The maximum duration of a first award is 24 months, and the total budget cannot exceed \$120,000
- ◆ **pilot study:** provide funding for proof-of-concept studies in animal health research. The maximum duration of a pilot award is 12 months, and the total budget cannot exceed \$20,000

Burroughs Wellcome Fund, Climate Change and Human Health Seed Grants

These grants aim to stimulate the growth of new connections between thinkers working in largely

disconnected fields who could together change the course of climate change's impact on human health. Small, early-stage grants of between \$2,500 and \$50,000 will be awarded through the program. BWF is particularly but not exclusively interested in activities that build connections between basic/early biomedical scientific approaches and ecological, environmental, geological, geographic and planetary-scale thinking, as well as population-focused fields, including epidemiology, public health, demography, economics and urban planning.

American Legion Baseball Scholarships

American Legion Baseball Scholarships are awarded to deserving baseball players who receive between \$500 and \$5,000 in scholarships each year. Each Department Baseball Committee may select a player from its department to receive this scholarship. While Department Baseball Scholarship winners receive \$500, eight players selected by a scholarship selection committee at the American Legion World Series will receive an additional \$2,500 scholarship. One other player, selected as the most outstanding member of the All-Academic Team, will be awarded an additional \$5,000 scholarship.
